DIG WATER WELL, LOCATE GASOLINE

"NOTHING NEW" SAYS FORMER TIGARD MAN

Explains That Auto Fuel Coming From Two Back Porch Filling Stations at Tigard

Has anybody in Glendale, Cal., a stray little gasoline well tucked away in their backyard?

The News-Press yesterday printed a dispatch from Texas telling of a family gas well where the owners can snicker at the oil barons.

The paper had hardly reached the street when J. E. Stedman, H2 East Chestnut, rushed the news to us that this wasn't anything new. He claims that at Tigard, Ore., ten miles southwest of Portland, there are two gasoline wells.

He maintains that the fluid coming from these back porch filling stations has shown a 54 gravity in tests—which is better than some of the stuff that motorists expend good money to buy—and that it works fine in the family filler.

Dug for Water
The wells were originally dug to provide water for the persons owning them. Water is a necessity but then so is gasoline in this day and age and who wouldn't trade water for gasoline—the filling stations give water free.

The Oregon wells are the only things in that state that faintly resemble an oil well, according to Mr. Stedman.
