FARM REMINDERS

Succession of crops in the garden may easily be arranged where moisture is not a limiting factor. Successions suggested in a new leaflet on the farm vegetable garden are early radish and lettuce followed by late carrots and beets; early spinach followed by celery; early peas followed by broccoli and fall cauliflower; early cabbage followed by fall lettuce and spinach; early beets and carrots followed by brussels sprouts and curly kale; early onion sets and turnips followed by late cabbage.

Even the most efficient farmer will have little profit left if his business is so small that his volume of sales is low, finds R. S. Beese, farm management specialist, in studying farm success and failure. The diversified Oregon farm doing a gross business of \$4000 to \$6000 annually has an opportunity to pay a profit above expenses. The average volume of business on Oregon farms is too small, records show.

To have sweet cream to ship attention is given to the following: Washing the separator twice a day; cooling the cream by placing the can in cold water immediately after separating; cooling the fresh cream before adding to the cold cream, and delivering to creamery at least three times a week in summer and twice a week in winter.

If artificial lighting of fowls is to be used most profitably it is accompanied by intelligent selection, segregation, handling and feeding of flocks, says a new bulletin from the Oregon experiment station on this subject. The greatest profits come from lighting the highest producing fowls.

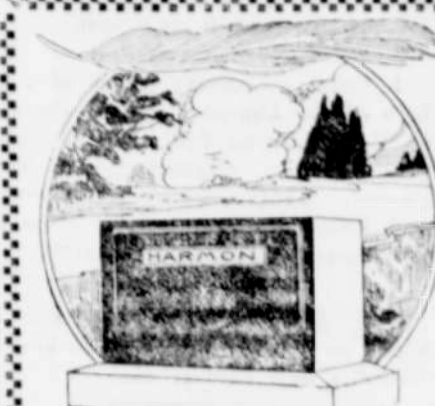

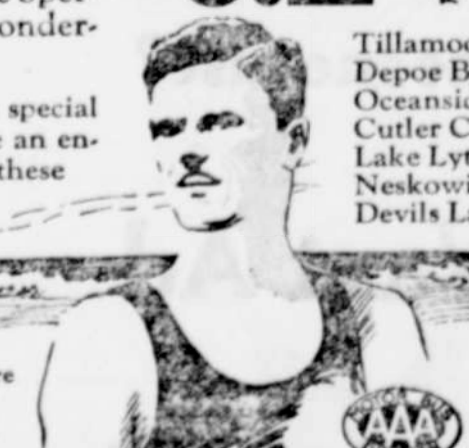
