OREGON STATE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

The following inquiries have come to the Land Settlement department asking for general information on Oregon. We have answered these inquiries, sending general literature and they have returned signed Questionnaires giving the following information:

21335-Mr. Alex Robertson, of Masonville, Michigan, expects to come to Oregon early next spring with the idea of securing enough land for poultry raising or dairying, on a commercial scale, either in central or western Oregon.

21336-Mr. W. A. Cunningham, % Bastanchury Ranch Co., Fullerton, Calif., is coming to Oregon about October 1, 1928. He wants from 60 to 120 acres, improved, in western Oregon, suitable for general farming. A friend, Mr. William Walls, 8648 California St., South Gate, Calif., is also very much interested in finding a location in Oregon.

21337-Mr. J. W. Jones, of Morgantown, Kentucky, is coming to Oregon this fall and wants to buy an improved 15 acres near Salem, suitable for general farming.

POULTRYMEN SEE FUTURE FAR MORE ENCOURAGING

The largest crowd ever to attend the annual poultrymen's convention at Oregon State Agricultural college compared reports from Oregon and Washington and agreed that in both states the low point in the industry has been passed, though the day when slipshod methods or small volume of business will make money is also passed if it were over here. Bad markets have squeezed out the "in and outers" leaving the situation better for the skilled breeders and egg men.

Market possibilities for large white light-yolked eggs are bright, but not for poorer grades. A total of 281 men and women registered, and stayed for two days of educational program, exhibits and demonstrations. M. S. Shrock, Milwaukee, was elected president and F. L. Knowlton, Corvallis, secretary-treasurer. A straw-vote taken on the national election turned out to be one for Hoover.

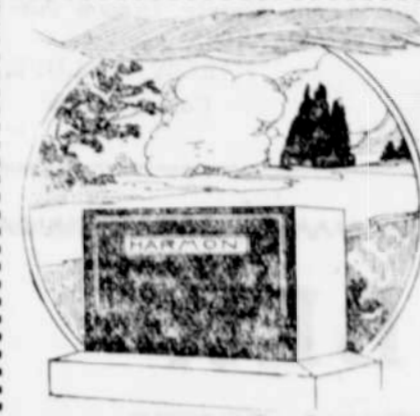
