R. O. T. C. GIVEN SYMBOL OF ITS IDEALS

Playing an important part in the growth and expansion of this nation's educational program, many large industrial institutions have been and are today actively engaged in furthering the education of the youth of America, chief among these is the motor car industry, it is claimed.

Evidence of this was again given last week at one of the most impressive ceremonies of its kind ever held in the San Francisco bay region, during which, school colors and the American flag were presented to the San Leandro high school R. O. T. C. by the Durant Motor Company of California, according to a communication received here yesterday by Otto Erickson, local Durant dealer. The event which marked the first public appearance of the school military squad in formation, was attended by city and county officials, Durant executives, R. O. T. C. heads and others.

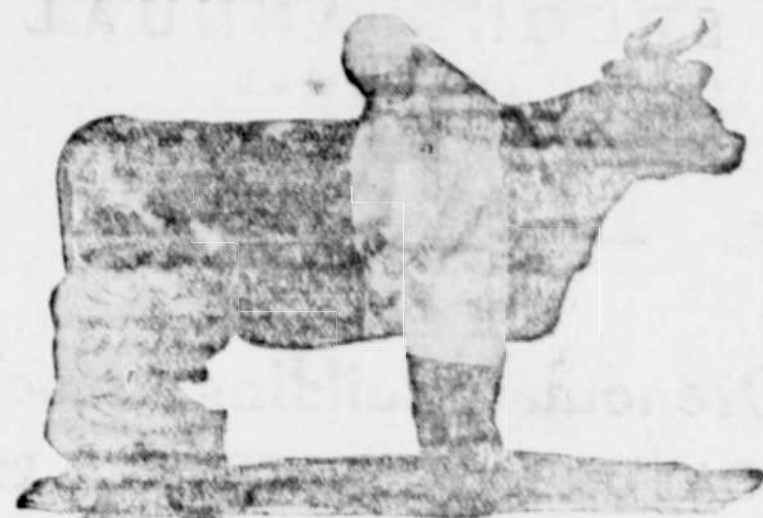
One of the first of the large factories to locate in the district, the Durant plant is credited with contributing much toward the establishment of San Leandro's high school a little more than a year ago. The factory is located on the boundary line of San Leandro and Oakland. It is pointed out that since the plant commenced operations in 1922 the former's population has increased from approximately 6000 to more than 11,500.

Since that time many other industrial units have been established in and around San Leandro, thereby bringing to the city thousands of families and necessitating the increasing of educational facilities. At present, asserts Mr. Erickson, among the 850 men employed at the Durant factory alone, approximately five hundred have families residing in the district.

In making the presentation of the school flags, Al G. Waddell, vice-president of James Houghlin, Inc., Pacific Coast advertising agency, acting for De Vaux, said: "Success such as we all dream about in this, the training of our lives, is cultivated by the R. O. T. C. The ability to exercise leadership in peace or national need is best brought by this means given us by our great government. The World War has given us a crop of young men that learned discipline, quick thinking, and an ability to use their heads in an emergency."

"The success of the R. O. T. C. in wartime has caused the stamp of approval to be placed on it as a powerful peace-time tool for constructing bodies and minds equal to the demands of business life or national defence.

Pacific International is one of the four shows in the U. S. where the "All American" selections are made.

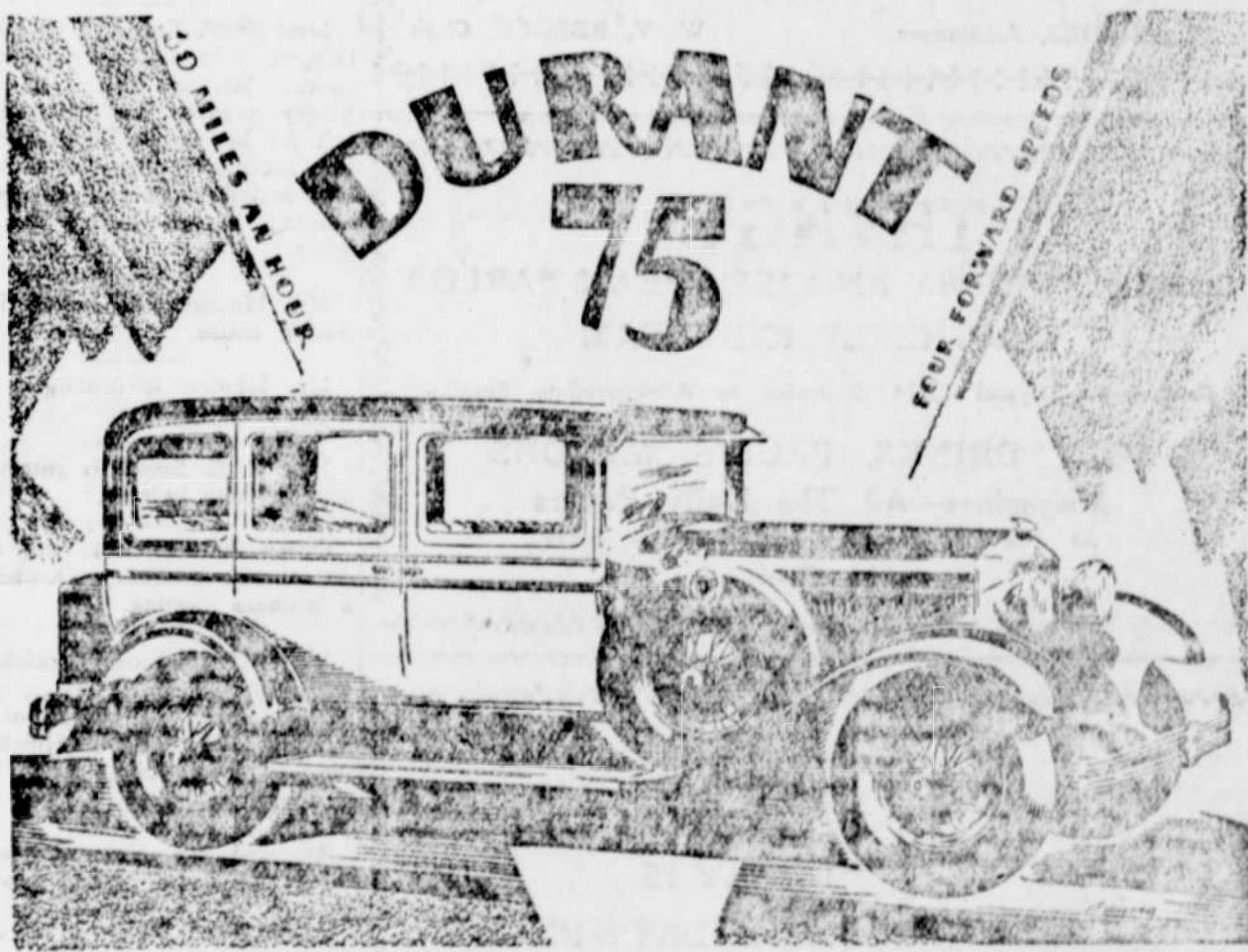
