**"Early Community History" Theme of Address Given by Hannah Christensen**

Hiteon club met Wednesday, Sept. 26 at the home of Mrs. Clara Pickett. Roll call, suggestions for fall bulb planting" was responded to by seventeen members. The program committee for the coming bazaar are at work and the earning committees are making plans. This was a social meeting and Hannah Christensen gave a very interesting talk on "Early Community History."

Two of the earliest settlers in this neighborhood were the Fanno family who came here in 1845 and the W. J. Robinson family who came in 1851. The first school was held in Ames chapel. During the cold winter of 1862 hay was \$100 per ton and a wagon box full was as large a load as was hauled. The earliest settlers in what is now Tigard and surrounding country was Geo. and Sol Richardson who came in 1840 or 47, each taking a section, or 640 acres of land. Mr. Tigard and family came in 1852 and he was too late to take up a whole section. Mr. Tigard gave 100 acres of land to have their first house built. An early settler named John Gault dressed all the lumber by hand to build it. His labor came to \$300, the amount received for the hundred acres of land. Mr. Geo. Frewing came in 1879 and as he was not used to an axe he used a hand saw to cut down the small trees and brush. He made all the rails and carried them out on his back to fence his hundred acres. He was the first man to build a fence with posts and everybody was sure it would not stand. All the fences were what was called worm fences. He owned the first umbrella in Tigard which was quite a novelty. Mr. Wood and family came and bought a claim in the wilderness in 1867.

Butte school district was organized 75 years ago, three years before the McKay school or district 18. For the past 12 years a reunion has been held by that school which is a very enjoyable gathering. For many, many years that was the only school in that section of the country. Ames chapel was the only church in the whole country except church and Sunday school was held in the school house. Ames chapel was also the voting place from the county line this way, taking in Scholls, Beaverton and Garden Home.

Butte school stood where the Aris home is now and was in a dense forest of trees with just a trail like leading to the door. The main treat of the children was a picnic once a year on the banks of the Tualatin. No school or Sunday school program or Christmas exercises were held for years to break the monotony and the length of the school term was three months.

As far back as 1880 there was no post office at Tigard and Mr. Wood brought the mail to all the settlers from Portland, on Saturdays. No one ever imagined such a thing as R.F.D.

After selection of the names has been completed and every discrepancy cleared up, signs of a campaign will be seen in the preparation of markers and driving of posts will immediately begin.

The Commercial club has received hearty support from Aloha merchants who do not belong to the club but who are interested in having this improvement carried out and are helping to defray actual expenses. One subscription even came from as far as Beaverton to help along.

Enough people were present to sit nine tables of 500 at the party. Many new residents attended presumably on account of the selection of street names, but they became acquainted with their neighbors and the wish is expressed by the Ladies Auxiliary and the Commercial club which got up the card party that these new comers become regular comers.
