The following people have written to the Land Settlement department asking for information on Oregon. We have answered these inquiries, sending general literature and they have returned signed questionnaires giving the following information. (These prospective settlers are all sufficiently financed for their needs.)

21458—Mr. K. H. Krogstad, Route 1, Box 166, Placencia, California expects to make a trip to Oregon in April or May of next year, with the idea of securing an improved place in western Oregon, suitable for general farming. Says he wants about 200 acres and that he has made several trips through western Oregon and likes the country very much.

21459—Mr. Forest H. Young, of Park City, Montana, is coming to Oregon just as soon as he can dispose of his property there. He is interested in either the western or central part of the state. He wants to get about 80 acres, suitable for dairying, with some poultry and fruit.

21460—Mr. W. E. Brown, Box 733, Prescott, Arizona is coming to Oregon next spring. He wants a small acreage in the Willamette valley, suitable for garden truck, also chickens, as he is particularly interested in the poultry business.

21461—Mr. J. M. Wandler, R.F.D. 1, Berryton, Kansas has sold out and is coming to Oregon in the spring. He is interested in securing a farm somewhere in the Willamette valley and would like to receive weekly newspapers from points south of Portland and from the Astoria districts.

21462—Mr. Edwin Ward, Jr., of Inland, California is interested in securing an improved 20 acres where he can do diversified farming and is coming as soon as he can dispose of his property. He is interested in irrigated land where the water rate is not too high.

acres, close to good schools, market and on a good highway. He is going to establish a chicken hatchery and poultry farm.

He is particularly interested in eastern Oregon and wants about 80 acres, unimproved, where he can raise corn, hogs, alfalfa, chickens, turkeys and cows.

FARM POINTERS

Where strawberry plantings in Oregon are infested with the corn borer this time of the year, the only effective way of handling them is by pulling up and destroying infested plants. The small root weevils are controlled in the spring by poisoning but this is not effective with the larger borers which are a different species, says the entomology department of the experiment station.

An electric motor with direct connections with the pump is found the most satisfactory source of power where irrigation by pumping is practiced. In many sections electricity is not available and an engine must be used, but recent experimental data gathered at the Oregon station show that difference in labor cost will more than make up any increase in the fuel bill where electric power is possible.

Though the hot weather is past it is just as important as ever and sometimes more so that the cream be artificially cooled as soon as separated, warns the dairy department of the experiment station. In some parts of Oregon production is low now, so that cream is shipped less frequently than in the summer. Demand for high grade cream is growing as it is impossible to make high class butter from poor cream.

Some Oregon growers of European hybrid type grapes are reporting reduction in yields caused by powdery mildew which appears as a whitish coating on leaves and fruit. Standard control of this fungus disease, used with success in this country and Europe, is application of sulfur dust as soon as the leaves emerge in the spring and at 10-day intervals thereafter well into the summer, says the experiment station. Waiting until after the disease appears will defeat later efforts.

VOICE AND PICTURES NOW SYNCHRONIZE

New Apparatus Made Available for Schools, Churches and Motion Picture Theatres.

Engineers are now at work on a simplified photophone device suitable for use in the home, which will make it possible, it is stated, to reproduce "talking movies" in the home very much as the ordinary radio broadcast programs are now being received in more than eight million homes.

This announcement was made by General James G. Harbord, President of the Radio Corporation of America, at the formation of a new company to be known as "R. C. A. Photophone, Incorporated."

In discussing the formation of the new company, General Harbord pointed out that although the Radio Corporation, General Electric and Westinghouse had been preparing for several years to market apparatus synchronizing voice and music with motion pictures, public introduction of the apparatus had been delayed until the engineers had achieved "complete practicability" so that it would be as simple to operate as a radio set, and, at the same time, highly perfected.

"The Photophone," said General Harbord "is both simple and practical. The essential principle is the recording of pictures and sound on one film. While various methods have been devised for 'talking movies,' experience has shown that the most practical is that of recording pictures and sound on the same film. This is the method employed by the Photophone. It is now possible to photograph the President of the United States—voice as well as action—and to distribute films reproducing the event throughout the country."

Uses and Operation
"Easily operated reproducing apparatus for use in theatres, schools and churches will be nationally available. An entire opera, musical comedy or drama can be electrically recorded on the film, just as it is seen and heard, and then reproduced from the same film. Whatever can be seen or heard, whether it is a nightingale singing or an army in battle, can now be recorded and reproduced for both the eye and the ear. Moving picture drama with complete orchestral accompaniment, or with music and speech, will be available for nation-wide use."

"Standard films without the sound can be used without any change in the machine. The only thing the operator has to do is to close one switch when he is projecting pictures with sound, and open it when he does not want the sound. Any type of 'talking film' can be used in the machine. The type of sound reproducer to be used will vary with the size of the room in which the pictures are to be shown. The reproducer embodies some remarkable new developments in acoustics."

"Sight and hearing have been the two avenues of approach to the human mind for education, religion and entertainment. Now one medium combines the appeal to sight and hearing simultaneously, with universal accessibility and availability. The complete practicability of the new art has already been demonstrated, and there remained only the need for an intelligent and serviceable system of manufacture and distribution."

"One can only guess at the many varied uses of this invention as an instrument for the spread of knowledge, for bringing the people of the world closer together, and for the advancement of civilization."
