ESTIMATED THAT 20 LOADS OF ROCK NEEDED

The water committee of the Beaverton city council made a survey of the streets and crossings inside the city limits Tuesday and they estimate that it will take 20 loads of crushed rock to fill in the holes in the streets and make them passable for the winter. This report was sent to Hillsboro and filed with the county court Friday so that the city could secure its proportion of the road funds, else if not used the money goes to the rest of the county. Another reason for haste was the fact that the rock crusher will shut down for the winter in a couple of weeks and the committee wants the work done this winter.

The committee also inspected the ditch being dug on East Lombard street and ordered it cut deeper so that all surplus water would be carried away. There is a leaking water main on Lombard street in front of C. E. Clements home and this was ordered repaired.

WILMA TUTTLE WINS THE COUNTY PRIZE

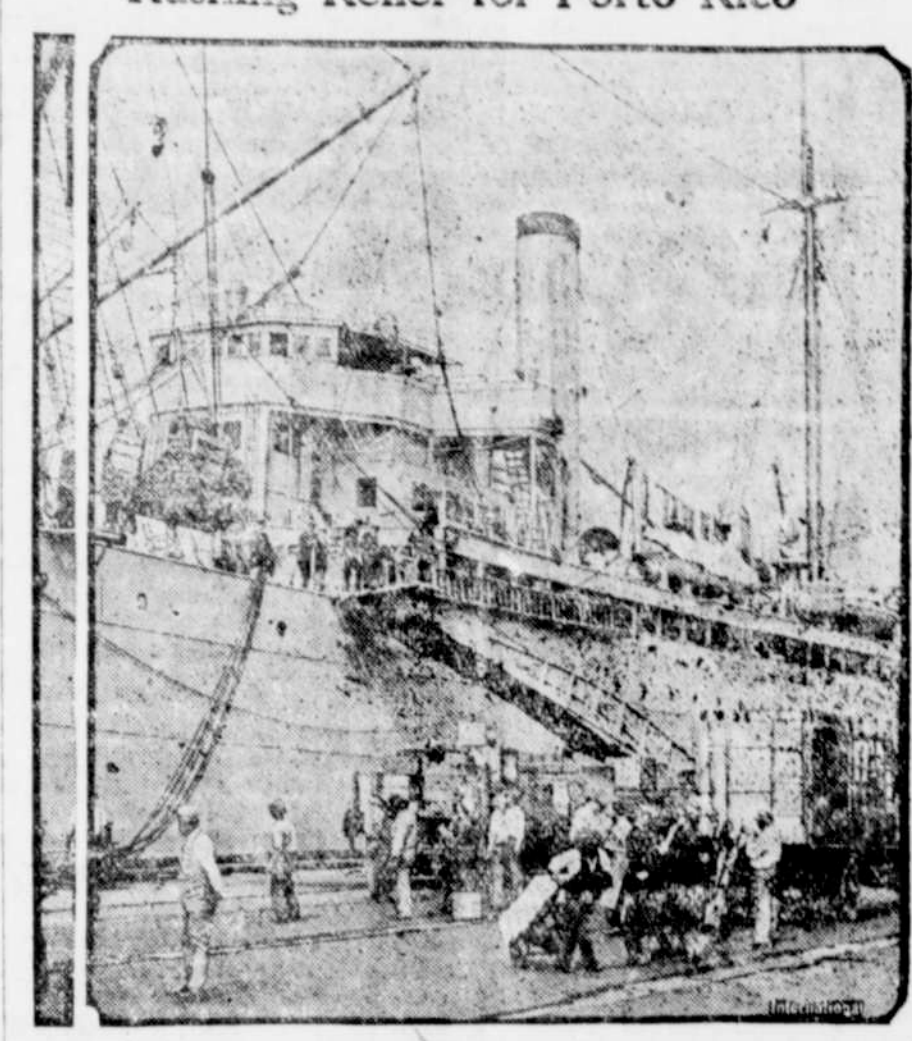

MANY POTATO GROWERS PASS FIELD INSPECTION

TOTAL ACREAGE OF CERTIFIED SEED POTATOES LARGER THAN 1927

The first inspections for potato seed have been completed in Washington County by the Farm Crops Department of the Oregon Agricultural College.

In case of the certified grade of seed potatoes, fields must show not more than 5% of total of Nosaic, Leaf Roll, and other potato diseases. Standard grade allows a slightly larger percentage and includes those potatoes which will not quite make the certified grade. The standard seed potato is used for commercial planting. The total acreage of certified seed potatoes in this county this year is larger than for 1927.
