FREEDOM OF THE WHISPER

Another more or less hopeful condition in America that usually brings wholesome results is the fact that no candidate for the Presidency or other high office can ever be elected without having his past life related, his present attitude questioned and his future policy doubted.

The freedom of speech has given way to the freedom of the whisper. What difference does it make whether a man whispers or talks aloud? It is his sense and sentiment that count, and more than all, his logic. A whisper, like a knock, recoils and reacts against the one who invents and instigates it.

But America is said to be a free country, and in very many respects it is such. Freedom of thought is one of those inalienable rights, and thought is capable, within certain bounds, of giving expression in word or whisper. It is not what one whispers, but with what logic he whispers that determines his moral or legal right to do so. But no one should whisper what he would not speak out, altho it is a notable fact that a whisper can sometimes become more audible than the spoken word.

Those who are engaged in the so-called "whispering campaign" are being accused of some such acts as speaking aloud about one part of the Constitution and whispering about another part. Tho such doing, if true, should be deplored and condemned, one is still obliged to uphold and defend the bare right of the whisperer for whispering's sake. To strike at any form of free communication, guaranteed under the Constitution, is dangerous, indeed, as to sanction the use of the unbridled tongue or pen in all the venom of immoral and degrading statement. For the latter would kill itself immediately in a just condemnation of righteous citizenship; while the former would involve the struggle of decades and perhaps bloodshed to regain.

Whisper if you will, but say something consistent, sensible, practical and fundamental. Shout from the housetops, but reduce your emotion and prejudice to a proposition sane and sound enough to enable your listeners to act upon it with intelligent conclusions. Then after all the shouting and whispering is over, there will come a calm over the turbulent waves of the nation's thought, which will cause us all to settle down once more to our own private affairs; affairs of home and business, of school and church, of city, town and community. We will then go about the business of the pursuit of the dollar which many of us translate into terms of happiness. Whisper or no whisper, the country is safe.

If the political orators insist on making stump speeches they can find plenty of stumps in our denuded forests.

While the Wets, Drys, Catholics, Protestants, Anti-Saloon Leaguers, Ku Kluxers, Whisperers, Farm Relievers and Association Against The Prohibition Amendments are fighting valiantly for the "best man to lead and protect the people during the next four years," old man Big Business is sitting back, smiling, and saying, "What fools those mortals be."

FARM POINTERS

Before storing potatoes in Oregon it is best to sort them carefully to get out second growth, cuts, rots and other damaged portions. Immature and damaged potatoes are more likely to break down in storage, and sometimes cause others to spoil.

Farm machinery in Oregon is valued at more than 35 million dollars, or over half the value of all livestock in the state. This machinery if left in the open deteriorates far more rapidly because of rust. Farmers may save money on repairs by taking care of machinery during the winter and repairing it ready for use in the spring.

Maggots found in decomposing organic matter are poison to poultry. Mortality can be expected when they are allowed to eat maggots.

Mangels, or cow beets, may be lifted by hand or with a horse drawn beet lifter. The latter is especially useful where the roots are set deeply

in the ground. In the absence of a commercial beet lifter, good work may be done with a breaking plow from which the mold board has been removed and set to run deeply enough to cut under the main portion of the root.

When oats or barley treated with formaldehyde gas is left moist in a pile or in sacks, killing of grain is likely to set in within 10 or 12 hours, warns the experiment station. To be safe, most growers sow promptly after treating or shovel the seed thoroughly to aerate it and get rid of the excess gas.

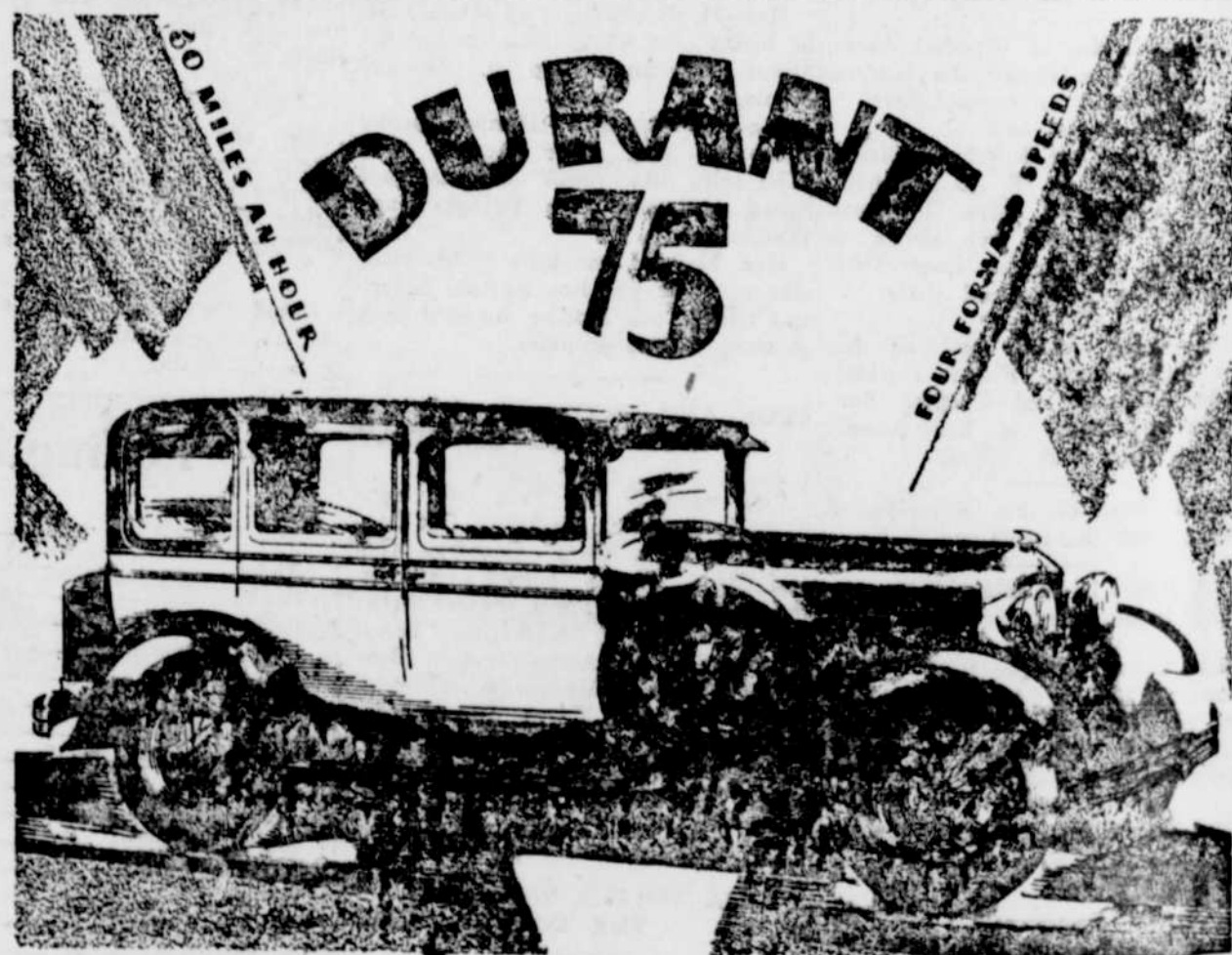
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
