PETITION FILED FOR NEW COUNTY ROAD AT ALOHA

A road petition, signed by a large number of resident freeholders of the Aloha and Reedville districts, petitioning the County Court to lay out and establish a County Road beginning at the termination of Wheeler Avenue, about a half mile north of Aloha, and extending thence due north on the township line a little less than one mile to a connection with the Base Line road, was filed and presented to the County Court, in their chambers at Hillsboro on Wednesday for immediate action. Matt King, H. A. Lowry, S. G. Rodgers, W. H. Benjamin, C. J. Stickney, Harry Sidwell, Hawkin Lindahl, C. L. Maxey, Mr. O'Meara and others vitally interested in this important road project were present in Court to witness these short preliminary proceedings, and by their presence to indicate the unanimous approval of the whole community for this long delayed improvement. This proposed road would make an extension of Wheeler avenue, the main business street of Aloha, due north to a connection with the Base Line road, and would also join at this point another improved County Road coming in from the north, thus affording direct connections at once with the Base Line road, the Walker road, the Cornell road, the Germantown road, and the Corneli-ous Pass road. We are informed that this would make the longest straight north and south road in the entire county.

Aloha is developing fast as a business and trading center, but has no direct outlet to the north, hence this proposed road is especially important from that standpoint, and is a very necessary convenience to a large and well improved agricultural section only a mile north of the paved highway, as well as the traveling public generally. While this proposed road is in no sense whatever a real estate scheme, it would, however, open up to settlement more than a hundred acres of undeveloped land that would be rapidly improved with small home sites, thus increasing a great deal the assessed valuations of the district. Attorney E. J. McAlear is representing the petitioners in the matter, and every step in the future proceedings will be watched with intense interest by the people of this section, as they feel deeply that this is a most important, logical and necessary improvement.

DEAN SHIRRELL HITS STUDENT AUTO

Nearly Always a Temptation to Waste Time, and Often Actually a Detriment to Morals, He Asserts

That an automobile "is to most students a temptation to waste time, and in some cases it is a detriment to morals," is the statement made by Elmer L. Shirrell, dean of men of the university, in a letter sent out to hundreds of parents of university students advising against the students bringing cars with them to Eugene this fall. Dean Shirrell took this step following an attempt to learn from deans of men of a large number of American universities what steps toward the control of student-owned automobiles have been taken in their particular institutions.

"We do not intend at the present time to make regulations on the subject of student automobiles as other universities have," states Dean Shirrell. "We should much prefer to have this problem solved by the co-operation of the parents of the students of the university. We believe that your own interest in the perpetuation of democracy in student life at the University of Oregon will lead you to agree with us that the automobile should not accompany your son to the university."

Luxuries Not Needed
"Real scholarship at the University of Oregon demands a good proportion of the student's time and the normal recreation of college life will consume the rest of it. The moderate allowance needed by each university man should not include expenditures for such luxuries as the maintenance of an automobile."

Dean Shirrell declared that the university administration recognizes that the automobile "is a valuable and necessary feature of our modern life," but that "we cannot admit that it is a necessary part of student life. There are rare cases in which an automobile is a necessity to a student and we are glad to make exception in those cases."

In a letter to mothers of girl students, Miss H. A. Frutman, acting dean of women, states that "an automobile operated by a girl student is a distinct liability."

A number of American universities have made hide-bound regulations against operation of automobiles by students during the school year, while others, especially those located in or near large cities, have none. It is impossible due to the fact that a large portion of the student body goes to the university campus by automobiles.

The University of Illinois bans use of automobiles by students during the school term unless a

permit be granted by the administration upon a written request from the student's parents. The University of Michigan has at present five people, including two state police officers, engaged exclusively in enforcing a similar regulation. The University of Indiana has also such a regulation.

Car Users Poor Students
At Princeton university, according to Christian Guass, dean of the college, it was found that the record of the group who had cars was considerably below the general college average. A strict regulation against use of cars was enforced, and the resulting record was, the dean declared to Dean Shirrell, "no very much better than was really no comparison."

Among institutions which wrote that they have no regulations against use of cars, except for parking rules and the like, were the University of Minnesota, Stanford University, University of California at Los Angeles, the University of California, University of Colorado, University of Iowa, University of Southern California, University of Wisconsin, Southern Methodist university, and Ohio State university. At the latter school students conduct their own traffic court.

The University of Oregon has taken steps recently to limit parking on the campus, and Dean Shirrell indicated that it intends to take no more drastic steps at present.
