## New Light Shed Upon Origin of Languages

It is now suggested that the student of language must look for origins in Africa. Doctor Marr, of the Russian Academy of Science, has announced that from the early Stone Age, when peoples of African type picturesquely dotted the European fringe of the Mediterranean, language has been brought down with the retention of some of the Africoid elements and words. The Hottentot language was a highly sophisticated speech, instead of a crude and primitive one, although, perhaps, not as formidable as the agglutinative Tagalog of the Philippines. Hottentot seems likely now to charm etymologists away from the progenitor tongue of the Teuton and from Sanskrit. It may make the Scythian plain but tarrying spots for speech, rather than the homeland of modern related languages.

## French Nation Shown as Great Landowner

The greatest landowner in France is the French state. It possesses palaces, castles, mansions, buildings of all kinds, and forests—besides roads, ports, railways. A record of all its properties, just drawn up, reveals a total value of \$3,800,000,000. The castle and park of Versailles are estimated at \$240,000,000. Fontainebleau is much cheaper, \$4,280,000, and its wonderful forest is worth only \$2,000,000. Also, the lovely castle of Azay-le-Rideau, in Touraine, is entered in the inventory for the ridiculous sum of \$20,000. To make up for that, the Louvre, in Paris, with its immense palace and the Tuilleries garden, comes up to the sum of \$290,000,000.

But the French administration refused to assign any monetary value to certain monuments, such as Notre Dame de Paris and the Arc de Triomphe, which symbolize a glorious past, or to the war cemeteries in foreign countries, under the French flag, where lie the children of France who sacrificed their lives for justice and liberty.—Washington Star.

## WATER PLANT BID IN BY ELMER STIPE

The Tualatin Valley Water Co. was bid in by Elmer Stipe, of Beaverton, at a sheriff's sale Monday at Hillsboro. He had brought suit to foreclose a mortgage of \$46,927.50.

The company was organized in 1913 and constructed a pipe line from Hillsboro to Beaverton and this city obtained water from this source for some time. Later the town of Beaverton constructed a pipe line to Portland and used Bull Run water, but wooden pipes were used and in a few years this line had to be abandoned as the pipes developed huge leaks. For the past year the city has used water from the Tualatin Valley Water Co.
