## NEW CITY OFFICIALS TAKE OFFICE

### MAYOR ERICKSON APPOINTS COMMITTEES FOR NEW YEAR

Last Monday evening the newly elected officers for the ensuing year took their oath of office at the city hall.

Mayor Erickson then addressed the council stressing the need for continued cooperation to develop the town. His message was as follows:

"The year of 1928 is behind us and while nothing particular outstanding was accomplished things that were necessary have been taken care of. In view of the fact that the amount of money available for betterments is limited, too much cannot be attempted or expected.

I want to thank the members of the council for their painstaking efforts for the welfare of the town. No complaint has been too trivial for an investigation.

The year just past has been one of considerable improvements, especially in our sanitary situations, ditches tiled and covered. This has only been made possible with the cooperation of the property owners. Watson Street has been improved and other streets graded.

To make a better and bigger Beaverton requires several things. Chief of these is better sidewalks and sewers, more civic pride among our individual residents, better fire protection and probably more important than anything else, is the water system. For the past year, in a financial way, it was a success, being the first year it has operated at a profit since the installation of the Bull Run system. From a quantity standpoint it was a failure, a condition which the present council will have to remedy if we expect the town to develop. With this in view and with the cooperation of the present council, on the same plane, we will be able to accomplish what we have set out to do, namely, a development of a water system that will be amply able to take care of the town of Beaverton and its future growth. Thanking you all for your kind consideration and for the hearty cooperation you have given."

After the new officers were sworn in the Mayor appointed the following committees for 1929:

Finance: Alexander, Manning; streets and sidewalks: Lewis, Alexander and Manning; sanitary, council as a whole.

City Attorney: A. C. Allen.

Marshall: V. A. Bixby.

Health officers: Drs. Welch and Mason.

A letter was received from the state board of health in regards to the open sewer running along the Southern Pacific tracks and it was laid on the table and action deferred until March 1, 1929.

Mr. Cunningham, of Baar & Cunningham, Portland, was present and discussed the water question. He was authorized by the council to work with the city attorney in preparing data for calling a special election to vote bonds for Bull Run water. The report will appear in next weeks paper.

A. C. Allen, city attorney, spoke in regard to the widening of Short street. A. E. Wilson made a motion which was seconded by Manning, that the town of Beaverton purchase from Messrs. Fordney and Hughson five feet of land on each side of Short street, the city to pay not over \$200 and the street to be paved at least 16 feet and in an amount not to exceed \$200. This is to be done with the understanding that Fordney and Hughson grade said street at their own expense and make a deed to said land, properly signed and executed.

Ordinance 24, relating to bond sale for Watson street improvement was read and passed.

The council decided to purchase a gun for the city marshal and A. E. Wilson was asked to purchase it.

## FINANCE BLDG. UNDER CONSTRUCTION AT ALOHA

### MODERN IN EVERY RESPECT

To House Aloha Finance Corporation New Organization with C. J. Stickney as President

A contract was let Monday to Duncan Gray, who resides on Vesta Avenue, at Aloha, and who has had years of building experience in brick and concrete work, for the construction of a new office building at the northeast corner of the highway and Wheeler Avenue for the Aloha Finance Corporation, of Aloha.

The new building will be 24 by 40 feet, one story, of tiled and faced brick of a light tan color, attractive plate glass front and corner entrance. A strictly fire proof, steel reinforced concrete bank vault, 10 by 12, will be built in the southwest corner, and full plumbing, rest rooms etc. are also provided for. The new structure is located about 24 feet north of the present north line of the paved highway, this set-back line being provided by the State Highway Commission to conform with their plans for the widening of the highway through Aloha. Mr. Gray and a crew of men broke ground for the new building Tuesday, and construction work will be pushed as rapidly as possible.
