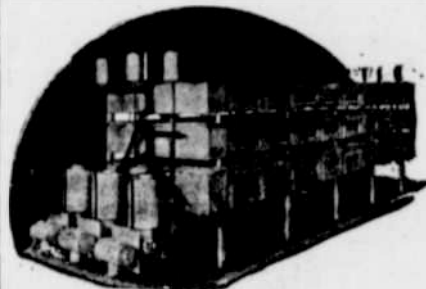

GEO. W. LIPPERT STARTS HATCHERY AT ALOHA

Geo. W. Lippert, owner of the Lippert Leghorn Farm, is starting a hatchery at Aloha. It is located in the former Wheeler Store building on Wheeler Avenue. He has recently purchased an "American" incubator of the capacity of 10,000 for one hatch. This exceptionally fine machine was purchased by Mr. Lippert in New Brunswick, N. J., arriving in Portland on Friday via the Panama Canal on the steamship "Luckenbach." The machine weighs about five tons and is considered one of the better makes of incubators.

The entire deck of eggs—over 3,000 in number—are turned by one movement of the turning system. The eggs are placed in separate compartments of which there are 30, each holding 300 eggs. In this machine



the moisture is supplied from the bottom, the heat from the top and the ventilation from the sides—just as these are supplied by the hen. This, Mr. Lippert explains, is for the purpose of getting hatches by artificial means as good as those offered by Old Biddy herself.

The machine is the triple-deck type and some forty feet long.

Mr. Lippert, who came to the famous Tualatin Valley from Wisconsin a year ago, has established himself and has developed his Leghorn Farm on the former old Buchanan place one half mile south of Aloha. He has about 1,000 Hanson Strain White Leghorns and some sixty pedigree cockerels. His hens have the reputation for laying large white eggs. His cockerels are of parentage from 250 to 300 eggs per year.

The Tualatin Valley is blessed with favorable climate and favorable conditions for raising chickens. The starting of a hatchery at Aloha, not only will be to Mr. Lippert's benefit, it will help in proving that this community is adapted to the raising of healthy, strong and profitable chicks.

Holmes Pine Protected

The purchase of an estate with a proviso that a certain pine tree upon it must not be cut down or removed has been recorded at Pittsfield.

The estate, once famous as the summer home of Oliver Wendell Holmes, is known as Holmestale. One of the restrictions in the deed is the following pertaining to an historic old pine in Canoe Meadows:

Subject to the restriction which the grantee agrees for himself, his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns to observe to wit:

"That the tree known as the Holmes pine, standing by itself in the meadows to the south of the homestead, should be allowed to stand as long as the course of nature permits, and that it shall never be cut down or moved while it remains in a live and healthy condition."—Boston Post.

Sounded inhospitable

In 1860, William H. Seward visited Minnesota in company with Charles Francis Adams and Senator James W. Nye. The citizens of St. Anthony, wishing to receive the distinguished statesman in a becoming manner, appointed a committee to meet the guests and escort them into town. After waiting some time, the committee learned that the party had reached town by another route, and returning to the hotel, were introduced to Mr. Seward.
