EARL E. FISHER

Earl E. Fisher, joint senator from Lincoln, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill counties, stole the bacon from under the noses of the political wise men of his district last April and May. His exploit, for it was nothing less will reverberate through the 1929 session. For it taught some counties that thought there was a gentleman's agreement that they should furnish the district's joint senator, that election chickens don't come home to roost until the votes are counted. Senator Fisher went after the nomination—and got it, while the big party boys who thought that nothing and nobody could defeat a former senator, a Tillamook business man, stood by, agnostic.

Keep your eye on senator Fisher. He is an interesting character. He coins personally descriptive epigrams while you wait. Here are some of them—a better key to his character than we can frame with our own words:—

"The cause of unrest is too much rest."

"Cares not what a man's religion is, provided he has plenty of it."

"Enjoys feeding a rock crusher 130 yards per day as the competition is not keen."

"Does not play golf, but is familiar with a grub hoe."

Reticent about dates, because they remind him of "epitaphs," Senator Fisher is proud of the hard work he has done. He is engaged in raising horseradish near Beaverton, operates a muskrat fur trapping farm and business, taught school for at least nineteen winters in his county, and is a bachelor. Was one time editor of the Beaverton Owl, a newspaper and served for three terms as mayor of that city. Was a representative from Washington county in the 1921 legislative session. Born at Beaverton September 18, 1870, educated in Beaverton grade and high schools, and in a Portland business college; likes to sing and enjoys playing in a band; has attended the Congregational church, and is "one of the common people."

He pays his respects to the four counties which he will represent in the state senate for the next four years, at least one of which was surprised by his election, in these words:—

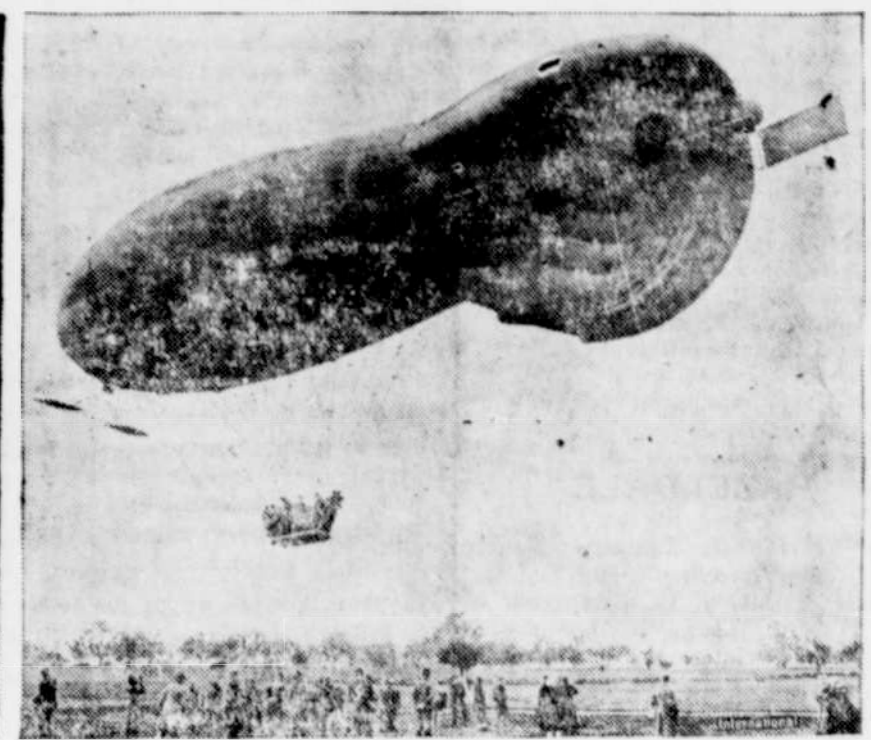

BEAVERTON RUPILS LEAD IN ENGLISH

Beaverton high school with five students sent to institutions of higher learning as freshmen last fall, tops the list of 107 Oregon high schools this year in records made by entering students in the fifth annual uniform placement examinations in English given by institutions under the auspices of the committee on higher English of the Inland Empire Educational Association. 2369 students took the test, which was composed of 135 questions or elements, many of which were subject to more than one error in making.

BEAVERTON COW WINS GOLD MEDAL FOR HIGH PRODUCTION RECORD

Beaverton, Ore. - Gem's Beauty Belle, a fine purebred Jersey cow, owned by J. J. Van Kleek and Sons, Beaverton, Oregon, won an American Jersey Cattle Club Gold Medal with her excellent record made in a recently completed official production test. Started on test when she was five years and one month of age, she yielded 653.55 pounds of butterfat and 11,905 pounds of milk in 305 days. During the time of this test she was with calf for 212 days.

In her highest production month, Gem's Beauty Belle reached a total yield of 85.53 pounds of butterfat, and in another month her yield was 80.74 pounds of butterfat. For four successive months her production remained above 72 pounds of butterfat per month.

Mr. Van Kleek has a splendid herd of purebred Jerseys and has done a great deal of production testing. Recently La Creole's Amy, a fine old cow in his herd became the second highest butterfat producer in the Jersey breed making an official production record after reaching 18 years of age. This cow, now in her twentieth year, yielded a total of 550.90 pounds of butterfat and 9,613 pounds of milk in 305 days on two milkings per day.

CARS IN HEAD ON COLLISION SUNDAY IN FRONT OF CHURCH

Eight persons were severely injured, one seriously, when a Hudson car driven by Denny Estep of Hillsboro and a Chrysler driven by Frank Welch, also of Hillsboro, crashed on the turn at Aloha about 8:30 Sunday evening.

With Welch was his wife and infant daughter Barbara. Mrs. Welch suffered severe cuts and bruises about the head and lost front teeth, three ribs of the child were fractured and Mr. Welch escaped with severe bruises.

According to the reports filed at the sheriff's office, Estep was driving east. There was a heavy fog and he says he was compelled to lean from the side window in order to see the edge of the pavement. On the turn he saw the lights of the other car and drew off of the pavement as far as possible, but was struck by the car driven by Welch. Estep says that when hit his car had almost come to a stop.

Following the accident traffic near the scene immediately became congested and the heavy fog made travel dangerous. Officers who appeared and straightened it out and investigated were Deputies Schendel and Parsons and State Officer McMahon.
