MAGAZINES IN EAST

Verne Bright has placed a score of poems with various magazines throughout the United States within the last few months. "Poetry" of Chicago, the leading verse magazine in the country has accepted "Pioneer" "April Moments" and "Death's Hour" for publication in the near future. "Frontier" of Missoula, Montana, will use a group of three poems, including one on Joe Meek, in its March issue. "Frontaloon" of San Diego, in a special Oregon edition to be out in March, will print a ballad, "The Last Baccanor" and a prose article on Oregon poets. "Contemporary Verse" of Atlantic City published a sonnet, "Panther" in January and will use another poem, "The Ballad of Aengus" in an early issue. "Christian Century" of Chicago used a sonnet, "A Beggar in Paradise" in the January 17 number. "The World Tomorrow" has accepted "Mystic" and "Camera Craft" of San Francisco is using three poems. "Muse and Mirror" of Seattle will print a group of several poems in the next issue. Also "The Oracle" of New York and "American Poetry Magazine" of Wauwatosa, Wisconsin are using a number of poems.

Mr. Bright will also be represented by four poems in an anthology of poetry named "Unrest" and published by Stockwells of London England.

Who's Who in Oregon and Who's Who in American Literature are running biographical sketches of Mr. Bright in their current volumes.
