INSTRUCTION COST LOWER

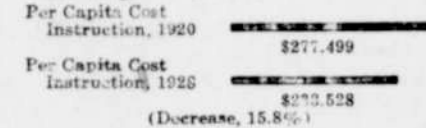
State University Economical, Say New Statistics.

Eugene, Ore.—That the University of Oregon has followed a program of close economy in administration is shown by figures just prepared here by the university staff statistician. In 1920 the per capita cost of instruction was \$277.499 for each student, and in 1928 this had dropped to \$233.528. An increasing share of this is now being borne by the students also, thus showing a large decrease in per capita cost to the state. The 1928 figure is far below that of many high and other schools in various parts of the state, it is declared.

A table showing the consistently decreasing per capita cost and a chart representing the difference between 1920 and 1928 are given below:

It will be noted that the per capita cost of instruction has declined from \$277 in 1920 to \$233 in 1928. A graphic representation of this decline is given below:
