Mrs. M. C. Brickell will entertain the Pre-School Circle at her home Tuesday, February 12th. All members are urgently requested to be present.

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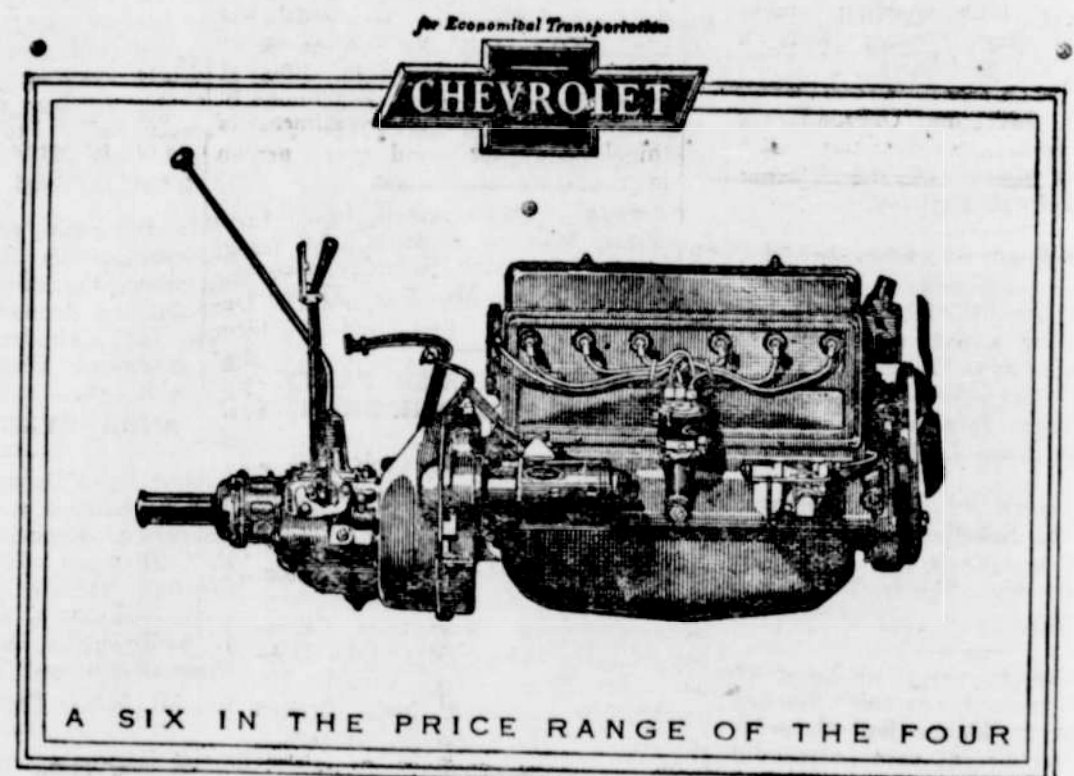
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
