HITEON

The Hiteon Club met February

call. The lunch table was graced
with a large birthday cake in honor
of the president, Mrs. Gladys Meyer's
birthday which was February 12.
Mrs. Vernonia Davies gave an interesting
reading on a "Trip to the
Philippines." In part her reading was
as follows: The Philippine Islands,
lying off the southeast coast of
Asia, are very mountainous and many
of them are volcanos, the highest
being 10,308 feet.

These islands have many climatic
changes the temperature ranging from
60 to 90 degrees. The three seasons
are as follows; from the middle of
November to the middle of March
which is the most agreeable season;
from the middle of March to the
middle of July is the dry season;
from the middle of July to the middle
of November is the rainy season.
Typhoons are very frequent, often
doing great damage. One of the chief
industries is agriculture and hemp is
raised extensively. It also grows
wild in some places.

There are sixty species of animals
on the islands and domesticated animals
have been brought here. Seven
hundred species of birds also make
their homes here as well as many
reptiles and fish.

The inhabitants are mostly negro
and Spanish. They have excellent
schools. Their government officials
include a Governor General, Vice Governor-General
and six assistants.
Governor-General Henry L. Stimpson
has been appointed secretary of
state for the United States by President-elect
Herbert Hoover.

Forests Are Depleted

Cuba has turned much of its former
forest land over to the growing of
sugarcane, says the American Tree as-
sociation. The coast line of Santo Do-
mingo, and the lowlands of Porto
Rico, are dotted with plantations of
cocoa, coconut and cane. But a great
deal more land has been cleared of
tree growth than is ever going to be
used for agriculture in the islands of
the West Indies. Much of it is a wast-
ing asset today. Porto Rico and Trin-
idad have depleted their once wide-
spread forest to a pitiful fraction.
The republic of Haiti has hardly a
stick of accessible commercial timber.
