BILL AFFECTING BOARD OF REGENTS OF TWO COLLEGES PASSED

Salem, Feb. 27—"Blessed be the peacemaker" is the course I have taken in regard to this bill," said Senator Edward Schullmerich, author of S. B. 192, which seeks to consolidate the board of regents of the University of Oregon and Oregon State College. The bill passed the senate with 24 votes.

"I have no personal feeling in the matter," Senator Schullmerich declared. "We are representatives of the state of Oregon, and it is our duty to see that these institutions are properly taken care of."

"It is our duty to step in and help make this problem better," Schullmerich continued. "There is not a single phrase or word in this bill that was not agreed upon by Presidents Hall and Kerr."

REP. FRANK PETERS OPPOSES HOUSE BILL 486

Salem, Feb. 27—"We should make laws for the people we intend to reach and discourage law violation," declared Representative Frank Peters, Hillsboro, in opposing H. B. 486 which was recently passed by the house. The bill provides for a license fee of \$15 for nurserymen.

"If the purpose of the bill is to regulate the larger grower its effect is to make of the small growers a law violator," Peters said.

"Bulb growing is becoming quite an industry in my county," he continued. "It does not require expert training as other branches of nursery business, and many small growers aid their income by growing bulbs."

Representative Peters suggested that a graded fee might be adopted on the basis of the ground used for such growing.

Representative Peters determined opposition resulted in eliminating gladioli bulbs from the bill, so in the amended form it passed the house.

VOTERS ON ALL BONDS MUST BE TAX PAYERS

Salem, Ore.—By a vote of 41 to 17 the house Friday afternoon passed Senate Bill 57, requiring that all electors voting at elections on bond issues or special tax levies must be tax payers on real or personal property.

DELEGATION OF VETERINARIANS VISIT STATE CAPITOL

Salem, Feb. 27—A delegation of veterinarians visited the state house last week to protest against S. B. 230, which provides that livestock can be tested for tuberculosis by the owner. Among them were Dr. S. M. Keagan of Hillsboro and Dr. W. P. Coon of Forest Grove.

Other visitors from Washington county were Mr. and Mrs. E. J. McAlear and Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Reynolds, both of Hillsboro. Mr. McAlear is a member of the law firm of Hare, McAlear and Peters and conferred with Representative Frank Peters, also a member of the firm, while here.

BILL FOR REFUND OF GAS TAX TO RURAL CARRIERS PASSES

Salem, Feb. 27—"I cannot support this bill," Representative L. E. Wilkes, Hillsboro, said in opposing S. B. 69, which was passed by both houses. The bill proposes a refunding of the tax on gasoline to rural free delivery carriers.

"If we let down on one class we'll have to on another," Mr. Wilkes declared. "We are paying another part of the government's expenses. From the taxpayers standpoint it sets a bad precedent."

Those who supported the bill contended that rural mail carriers are very poorly paid at present and that they can not operate at four cents per mile in winter when the roads are in bad condition. It was also pointed out that other western states have similar laws.

Representative Joseph N. Scott, Fendleton, said: "It seems to me the United States government should give adequate compensation to mail carriers. They are in better financial condition than Oregon."

TEXT BOOK BILL PASSES SENATE

Salem, Feb. 27—I have been teaching for 20 years and I and other teachers have given this matter careful consideration," declared Senator Earl Fisher, Beaverton, in defending S. B. 77, which passed the Senate recently. The measure proposed for the adoption of 10-year textbooks instead of six as is the law now.

"The time has come to put some business principles into our education. This is constructive legislation. Just after a federal census is the logical time to have new school books, so we can have data from the census in the books," Mr. Fisher said.

Senator Clarence Butt, Newberg, objected to the measure due to the too rapid changes in history. One change in 10 years is not enough, he declared.

"If the bill does not work people of Oregon will soon be publishing their own textbooks," said Senator Colon Eberhard, La Grande. "The textbook companies think that they have the people of the state by the neck," he said.

"Scientific investigation, new discoveries and continual changes in our method of instruction makes the bill impractical," Senator Edward Miller, Grants Pass, objected. "Fixing textbooks and methods of teaching for 10 years puts them in a straight jacket. We are dealing with living creatures with changes over night," he said.

Declaring that something was glaringly wrong with our present system in keeping parents struggling along to keep up with the changes in textbooks, Senator Jay Upton, Bend, defended the measure.

BREESE AIRCRAFT WILL BE IN NEW QUARTERS SOON

Machinery is being shipped from San Francisco this week by the Breese Aircraft Co. and they will be installed in their new quarters at Beaverton next week.

Captain A. I. Eagle, commandant of the Pearson's Flying field at Vancouver, Wash., and Vance Breese designer of the trans-Pacific monoplane Aloha are included in the list of men announced as directors of the Breese Aircraft corporation. Other directors are: B. E. Palmer manager of the Northern Pacific Terminal company; S. P. Pardee assistant manager of the West Coast Hydro-Electric company; Clyde G. Huntley collector of internal revenue; Burt Chappel vice-president of the Brotherhood National bank; Judge Ekwall of the Multnomah county circuit court; Bradley Ewers, attorney; Henry Hayek, president of Henry Hayek & Co., and Nelson E. Jones of San Francisco.

Breese, who is president of the company will act as chief pilot, and Jones will continue as vice-president and general manager. The company's operations will be fully controlled by the directorate under a voting trust which gives the board the voting right for the majority of stockholders for a two year period.
