SENATOR EARL FISHER FAVORS TUNNEL BILL

Salem, Feb. 27—"A tunnel is the shortest difference between two points declared Senator Earl E. Fisher, Beaverton, in recent support of his tunnel bill, S. B. 94, which passed the Senate. The measure provides for the organization of tunnel districts, construction, operation, maintenance and cost.

"We need the speeding up of transportation," he continued. Many of our highways are built over mountains, following old Indian trails. This bill does not provide for construction of a special tunnel, but is simply an enabling act. Every safe guard is provided."
