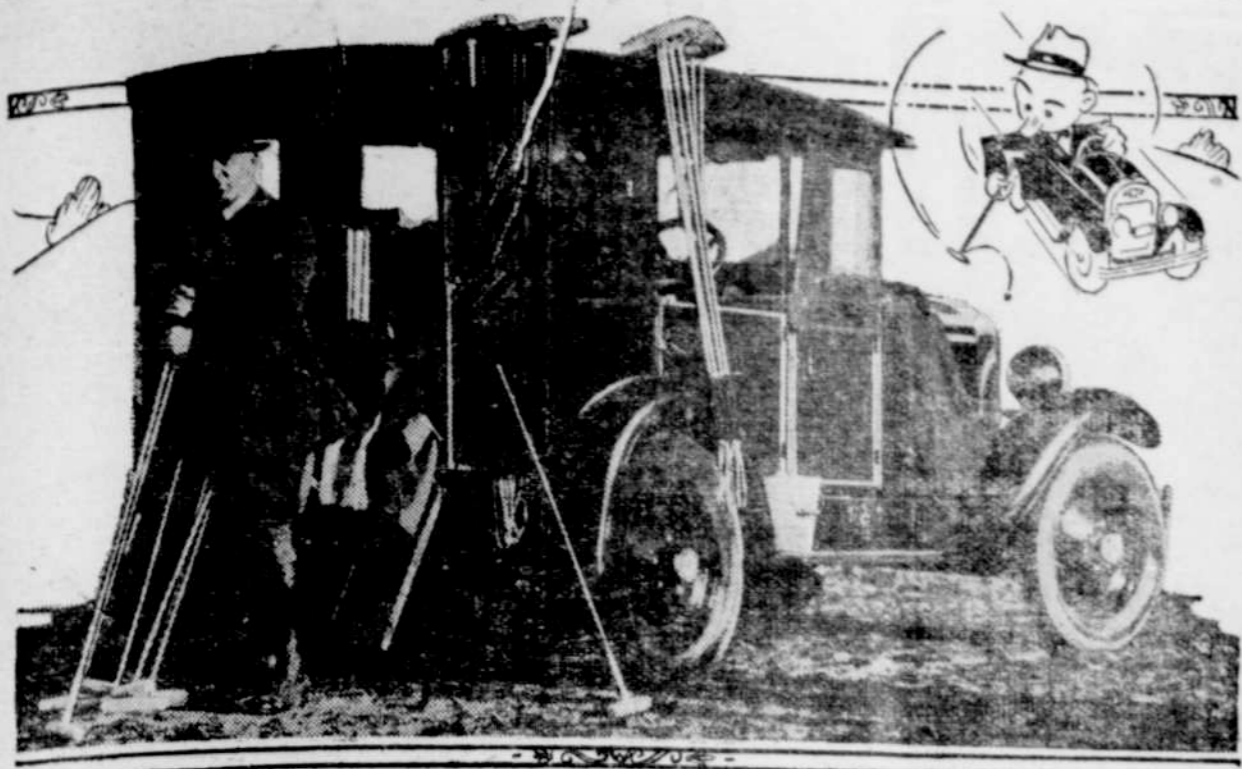


## NEW USE FOR MOTOR CAR
