SOLDIERING IN DIPLOMACY

International relationships have sustained a great loss in the passing of the beloved Ambassador, Myron T. Herrick, of Ohio. Even to the time of death he was engaged in soldiering in citizenship, that fine diplomacy as between nations which advances the cause of peace and mutual understanding.

Perhaps no diplomat or statesman of recent years has received more genuine acclaim than this man, who stood at his post of duty when warned to flee from impending disaster at Paris in the trying period of the World War. Myron T. Herrick stayed in Paris, although the official French government had removed to Bordeaux. His was truly an unselfish service and a courageous part in a great crisis. When a man can endear himself through devotion and loyalty, not only to the country that sends him, but to the people to whom he is sent as an official representative, as did Ambassador Herrick, it is fitting that his name and memory be held in respect by present and future generations. This will be the case.

It was Herrick who twice served as America's ambassador to France. It was he who helped in no small way to make Lindbergh's memorable landing at a field near Paris all the greater as an event of much significance between the two continents. It was he who, thru respect to the great leader Foch, stood in the drizzle with uncovered head which act of reverence led to the sacrifice of his mortal life.

But what of him in America? Herrick's influence was felt here as well as in Europe. He had many connections in the social, business and community life of the American people. When the world catastrophe ended, he found himself entrusted with seven millions of dollars as treasurer of Community Service, one of the seven great agencies which contributed so much to the success of the fighting forces in the lines of service during the World War. Herrick was one of a few men and women who can truly be termed world citizens. He saw America just as one big community, where the success of one community contributes to the success of the whole. He contributed in a large way to the perpetuation of American social ideals at home and these spread their influence abroad. He was a diplomat not so much by expediency as thru the hearts of the people with whom he had to deal. He was not something foreign to us, but was one of us. Thus Myron T. Herrick filled his destiny and set a worthy example in the service of his country.
