O.S.C. Co-ed Debaters Argue That Science Is Aid to Faith in God

The moot question of science
and religion which has enlivened
discussions in all manner of groups
from the "hot stove council" to
state legislatures and high courts,
has now come in for consideration
by college co-ed debaters.

Arguing the negative of the
question, "Resolved, that modern
science tends to destroy theistic
faith," two members of the Oregon
State college co-ed debate squad
have just invaded California and
met teams there from the College
of the Pacific at Stockton, Univer-
sity of California at Berkeley and
Mills college at Oakland.

Mamie Erickson of Bend, and
Opal Smith of Monmouth are the
two Oregon girls who maintain
that science and faith in God are
not in conflict but actually helpful
one to the other. Science without
faith, they say, obviously would be
come a curse, but science domi-
nated by the spirit of religion is
the key to progress and the hope
of the future.

The Oregon team quoted Mi-
chael Pupin, the noted physicist as
saying, "My beliefs as a scientist
do not contradict a single element
of the religious beliefs which my
mother and the people of her na-
tive village held when I was a boy.
Science has simply brought me to
a higher, broader view of the
Creator."

Wherever science has explored
the universe, the Oregon girls said,
it has found unchangeable order
and law. This, they said, leaves no
escape from the conclusion that
back of everything there is a defi-
nite guiding principle. Either this
law and order is the result of hap-
azard happenings or it is the re-
sult of divine intelligence. The
most distinguished scientists them-
selves accept the latter as far more
reasonable.

and Mrs. James Nokes.

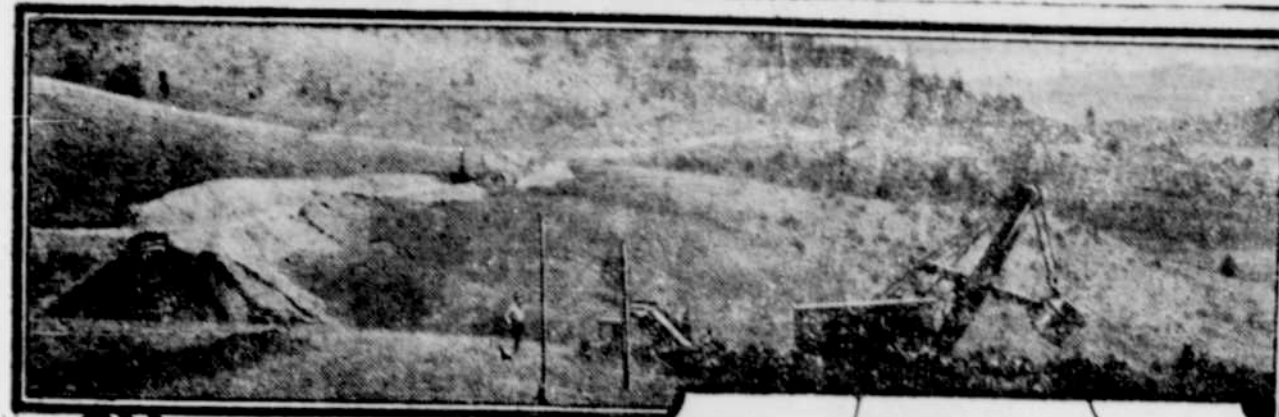
Helen Beaudoin gave a party to

\$40,000,000 RAIL PROJECT NEARS COMPLETION

SAN FRANCISCO.—Opening of the
Southern Pacific's new line be-
tween Klamath Falls, Ore., and Al-
turas, Calif., this summer, will mark
the completion of a building pro-
gram on which the railroad spent more
than \$40,000,000 for the construction
of 521 miles of new road.

This construction, most of which is
in new territory, was begun in 1920.
It gives northern California three
main lines and will bring northern
California and southern Oregon 211
miles closer to eastern markets. The
new track includes the 270 mile Cas-
cade line, the 155 mile Nevada-Califor-
nia-Oregon line, and the 96 mile line
between Klamath Falls and Alturas.
The new lines will not only pen-
etrate territory long known as the "last
frontier," but will materially benefit
shippers on the Pacific Coast and the
Pacific Northwest.

The Cascade line has already shrunk

the shipping and travel distance
between California and Pacific
Northwest points. It has cut the run-
ning time of trains to 22 hours between
San Francisco Bay points and Portland.
Its connection with the Great Northern
at Chemult, Oregon, provides the short-
est and fastest route between Califor-
nia and Spokane and all points east
thereof.

Creates Shorter Route

The construction of the standard
gauge track over the Nevada-Califor-
nia and Oregon line and the present
construction from Alturas to Klamath
Falls will create a route 211 miles
shorter than the present route via the
Southern Pacific's Cascade and Over-
land routes. With the opening of the
line from Klamath Falls to Alturas, all
freight moving either way between
Oregon and all points east of Ogden,

Utah, will be routed over this short-
cut. This route is not only 211 miles
shorter than the present line, but it
will also permit faster operation since
its curves and grades are much more
favorable than the present line via
Sacramento and Roseville.

The Nevada-California-Oregon rail-
road was originally a narrow gauge
line and was about to be abandoned
when the Southern Pacific acquired it
in November, 1926. Its connection
with the Cascade line via Klamath
Falls will practically provide all of
northern California and southern Ore-
gon with a new transcontinental line.
It will also open this territory direct-
ly to San Francisco on the south, and
Portland and the Northwest on the
north via the Cascade line connection
at Klamath Falls.

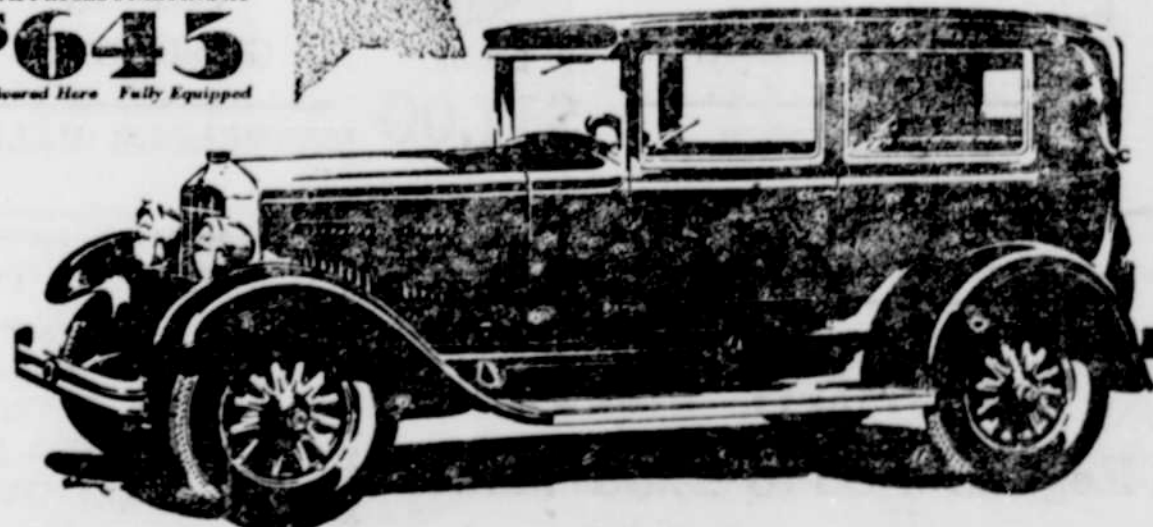
