"There is a real shortage of eggs in storage and the situation as regards the future looks very bright.

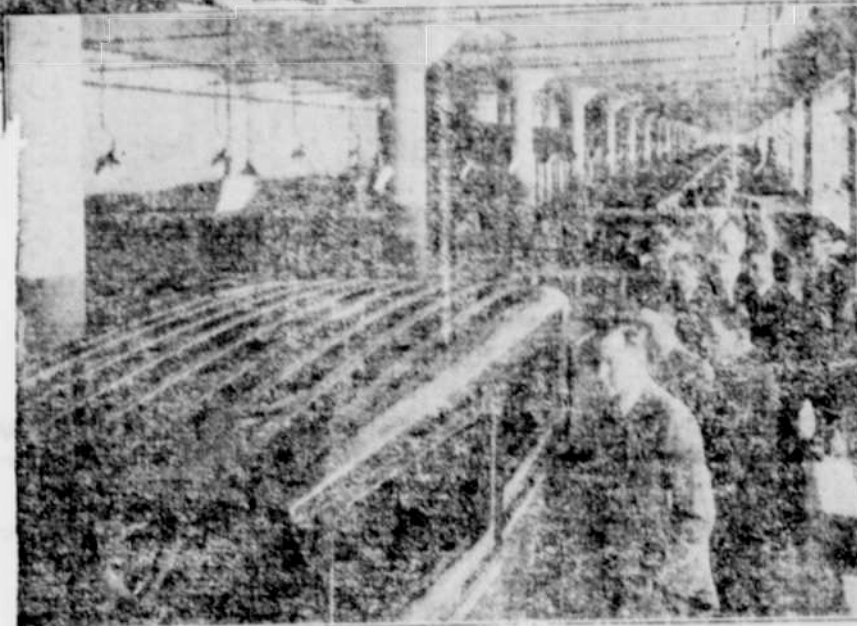
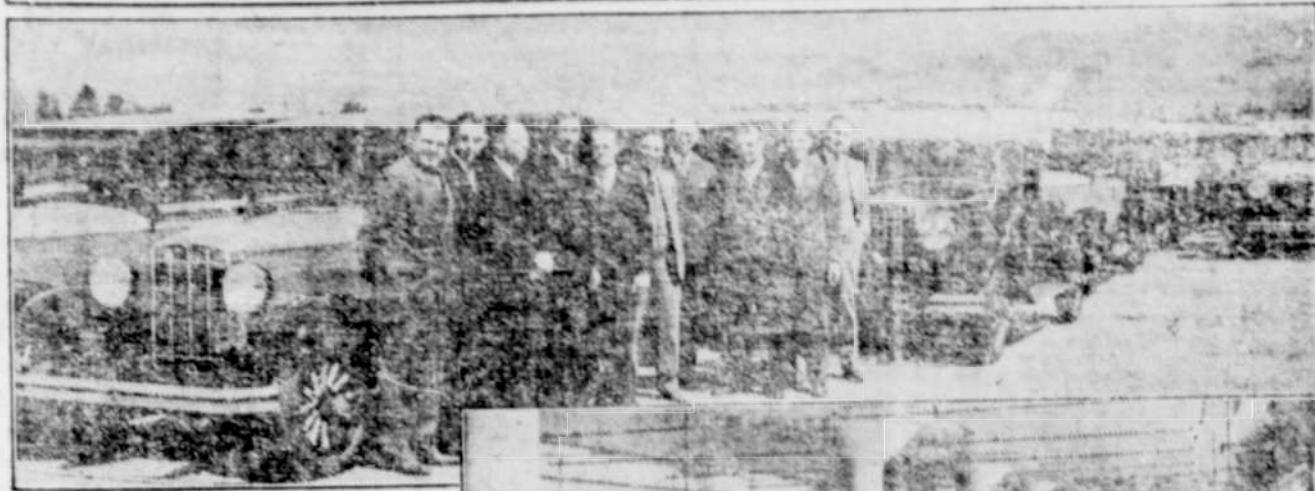
