**THE GRAND CANYON
AND ITS SURVEY**

The following letter was received
from Cecil D. Emmons who is now
in Arizona in the forestry service:

(Continued from last week)

The boys were visiting around their
fire in the lodge chatting with visitors
to the park who were much interested
in the hearty bunch of outdoor men
who were not expelled by the hard-
ships of prodigious mountains they
had come many miles to learn some-
thing of the mysteries which are con-
cealed in the interior of the park.
Stories and experiences of the men
were somewhat interrupted as I en-
tered the room dripping wet and
stood in front of the huge fireplace.
The boys become heavy drinkers of
tea and always kept hot water to
appease the beany thirst which ap-
proximately takes place in the evening.
This was of course just what I was
looking for so the public and all
joined in tea and some of the pastry
baked by our cook. The lodge was
our headquarters while at the Bright
Angel Camp. Stories from many
places and discriminating people were
enough for the folds of a book and
perhaps some have been placed in
magazines for that is the way many
seek material for their stories. Of
one I happened to know is Frank
Harrison Kent, author of "The Masked
Judy" and other stories which ap-
peared in the Saturday Evening Post.
Material for his next story to ap-
pear the first week in April Satur-
day Evening Post, "The Great North
west" is written on life of outdoo-
men in the city and their tasks in
the open spaces.

The next morning the party took
an early start for the descent into
the canyon to the river. We pre-
pared for what is termed as spik-
camp. Each man carries a por-
tion of food and field equipment for
a two day camp.

As we overlooked the terrific
depths that part the walls of hun-
dreds of castles of mountainous bulk
located only in barely discernible
penstrokes of detail, clouds of mist
were rising from the tops of the
temples and the canyon was com-
pletely filled with fog. As the sun
mounted, the curtain of mist sud-
denly broke into cloud fleeces, and
while we gazed these fleeces ris-
ed and disappeared, leaving the canyon
bare. At once around the bases of
the lowest cliffs white puffs begin
to appear and their number multi-
plies until once more they rise and
overflow the rim, and it is as if you
stood on some land's end looking
down upon a formless void. Then
quickly comes the complete dispa-
tion, and again the marshalling in
the depths, the upward advance, the
total diffusion and the speedy van-
ishing, repeated over and over until
the warm walls have expelled their
saturation. It is a place indeed created
by some magician's wand.

We descended into the canyon over
the Bright Angel trail and saw many

wonders and things of interest to
detract us from our attention of sore
and tired muscles due to walking and
heavy packs.

We reached the verge of the river
just as the sun was sinking in the
west. The canyon was sinking into
mysterious purple shadows, the Shin-
umo Altar tipped with a golden ray,
and against the leaden horizon the
long line of the Echo Cliffs reflected
a soft brilliance of indescribable beauty
a light that, elsewhere, surely never
was on sea or land. We stood upon
a sandy rift, confronted by nearly
vertical walls at whose base a tawny
torrent pitches in a giddy onward
slide that gives him momentarily the
sensation of slipping into an abyss.

Dwarfed by such prodigious shores,
which rise immediately from the
water at an angle that would deny
footing to a mountain sheep, it is
not easy to estimate confidently the
width and volume of the river.
Choked by the stubborn granite, its
width is perhaps between 250 and 300
feet, its velocity fifteen miles an
hour, and its volume and turmoil
equal to the Whirlwind Rapids of
Niagara.

For only a few hundred yards is
the tortuous stream visible making
its traverse by the surveyor tedious
and slow. Issuing as from a mountain
side, it slides with oily smoothness
for a space and suddenly breaks into
violent waves that comb back against
the current and shoot unexpectedly
here and there, while the volume
sways, tidelike, from side to side and
long curling breakers form and hold
their outline lengthwise of the shore,
despite the seemingly irresistible ve-
locity of the water.
