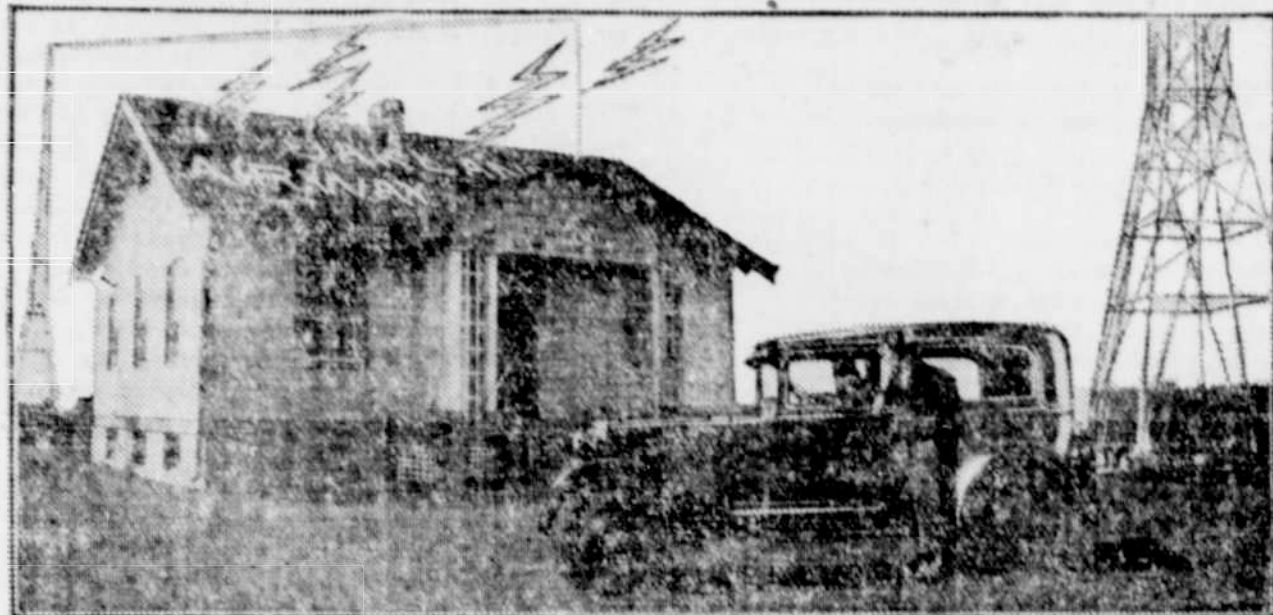

Funeral services were held at the Beaverton Masonic Hall Tuesday with interment at Crescent Grove Cemetery.

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
