John Overholtzer

The funeral service of John Overholtzer of Tigard was held Monday afternoon at the Evangelical church. He was born March 16, 1855, in Carroll county, Ill., and at the age of nine crossed the plains by ox cart with his parents to Sacramento, California. From there the family returned to New York and also lived in Missouri for several years before again coming to the Pacific coast where they settled in Coos county. Mr. Overholtzer came to Portland in 1882 and after graduating from Armstrong Business college he taught school in Washington county. In 1892 he and his family moved to Tigard where he was identified with business and civic interests.

Surviving are his wife and two daughters, Mrs. Oro R. Holoday of Gibbon, Ore., and Mrs. Anna M. Selander of Portland. Mr. Overholtzer was married to Mary M. Bahr at Myrtle Point, Oregon in 1878 and after her death in 1898 he married Nellie Freewing. His second wife died in 1905 and he married Mrs. Carrie Anderson in 1907.

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
