NOTICE RECEIVED FROM COUNTY AGENT

I have received the following no-
tice from County Agent McWhorter.
This notice was written by Mr. L. R.
Breithaupt, Agricultural Economics
specialist, O. A. C.

"Thinking that you may not have
received official information regard-
ing the extent of frost damage to
California fruits, and because of the
importance of this situation, will say
that it is estimated that the Califor-
nia peach crop may only be 50 per
cent of the 1928 production, cherries
50 per cent, pears 70 per cent, prunes
77 per cent and apricots 82 per cent.
Serious damage is reported for
plums, grapes and almonds. Vegeta-
table crops in scattered localities
were also damaged. Official reports
are qualified with the statement that
estimates of the actual damage are
somewhat difficult to make at this
time. However, trade journals are
carrying bullish reports with respect
to canned fruits especially, and more
interest is being shown in dried
fruits."

Everything points to a prosperous
year for Willamette valley fruit
growers and it is of great importance
that growers this year take
pains to apply all sprays recommended
by O. A. C. and to do every-
thing else in their power to take
care of their fruit.

In regard to the apple prospects
it is of interest to note that in
spite of last years light crop in this
district, that we are going to have
a rather light bloom this spring. Last
year, with proper pollination weather,
we would have had a bumper crop
some what in line with the yields
of Hood River and Yakima districts.
But the fact that our trees did not
set a crop last year, has not in-
creased our bloom to any notice-
able extent this year.

I believe that there is room for
quite a lot of experimentation in re-
gard to this habit of apple trees to
bloom one year and lay off the next.
Prospects for pears, prunes, cher-
ries, and plums are very good this
year.

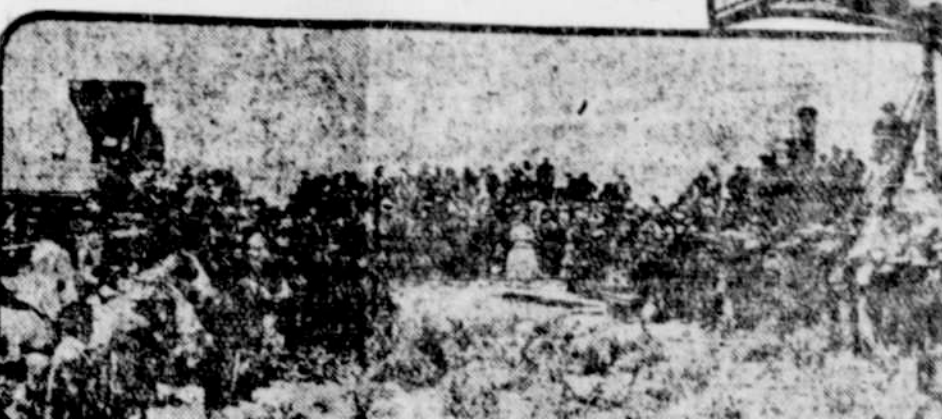

Building the First Transcontinental Railroad.



The sixtieth birthday of the South-
ern Pacific, first transcontinental rail-
road, is being celebrated May 10 by a
radio broadcast from KPO San Fran-
cisco, over the Pacific Coast network
of the National Broadcasting Company
and from KSL Salt Lake, Utah. The

broadcast will be from 9:30 to 10:30
p. m., Pacific standard time.
Reinald Werrenrath, famous bar-
itone, is coming from New York spe-
cially to take part in this entertain-
ment. To a musical accompaniment
of Construction day music there will

be told over the air the epic story of
the conquest of Sierra and desert,
which was probably the greatest of
pioneer accomplishments.
Construction of the Southern Pacific
its first unit, which was the Western
end of the first transcontinental rail-

road, cost \$61,000,000. The Southern
Pacific, which has grown with the
west, is still driving spikes and has
just completed in the last 15 years
construction to open up new territory
at a cost of \$88,000,000.
