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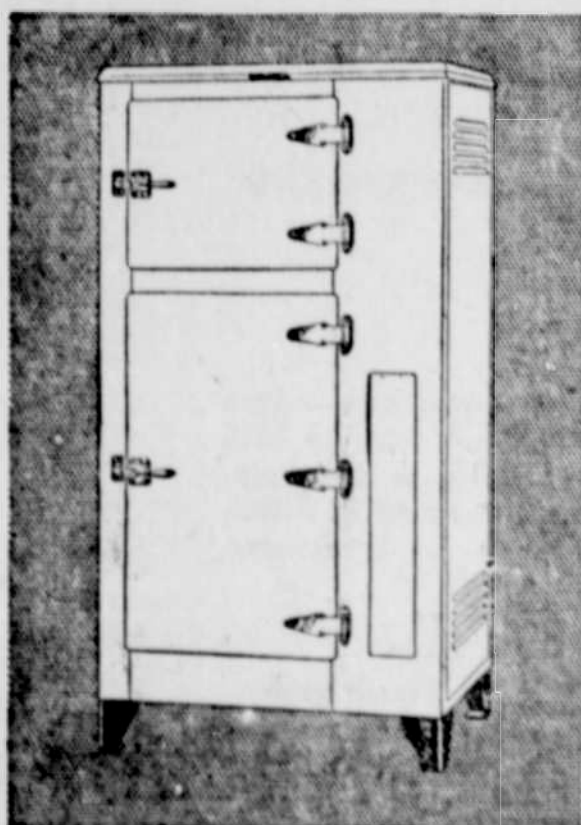
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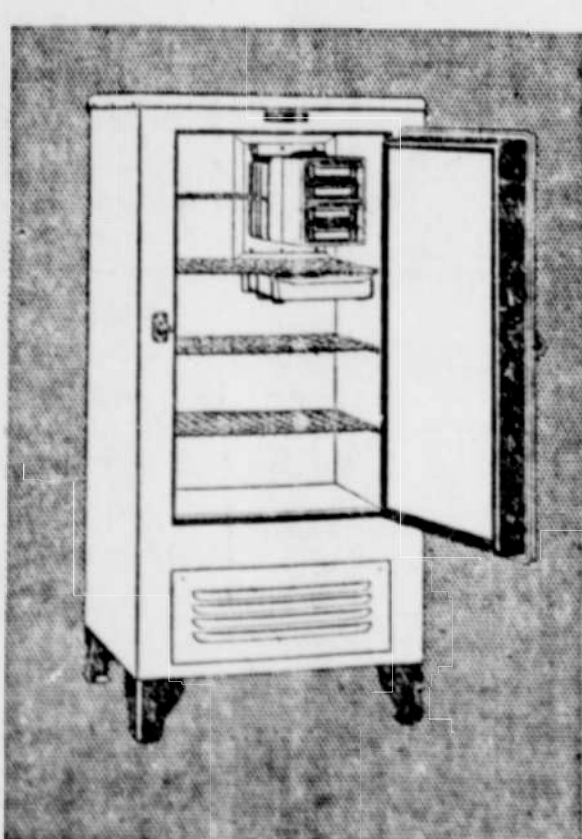
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Right: THE KITCHENETTE MODEL is for the small house or apartment. It has 4 cubic feet food capacity and 4 ice trays that hold 36 cubes.
