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OREGON REFERENCE BOOK READY FOR DISTRIBUTION

The initial volume of "Who's Who In Oregon" is just off the press and is ready for distribution throughout the state. The book is the first venture of its kind ever attempted in Oregon and is published by the Oregon City Enterprise, nearly two years having been spent in its compilation and editing. There are about 2,800 biographical sketches in the book, which carries no advertising nor pictures, but is restricted to actual reference material concerning prominent men and women of Oregon.

Lewis A. McArthur, author of "Oregon Geographic Names," has written a foreword for the book, which is bound in maroon leather and lettered in gold. The publishers state that not a single sketch has been paid for and that the volume represents a successful effort to issue an Oregon biography free from puffs.

"Who's Who In Oregon" consists of 242 pages, including a table of abbreviations, an introduction, preface, and interesting information about the state. The edition has been restricted to 1,000 copies, of which 1,200 have been ordered by subscribers.

Avoid Gas Oven Rust

Rust in the oven of a gas range can be avoided if the door is left slightly open for a moment after the burners are lighted. The open door permits the escape of the moisture produced by combustion and prevents its too rapid condensation on the sides of the oven. A further protection for both the oven lining and the burners is an occasional application of oil or grease to form a moisture-proof film. The substance used should be free from salt, and should be applied while the metal is warm.

Peas that are too hard for serving plain may be cooked until tender, pressed through a sieve and the pulp used for soup.

Left over plain lemon jelly dessert may be cut up into cubes and mixed with fresh vegetables for a salad.

Although high priced now this season's rhubarb can be canned to advantage as it is of good quality, and if canned now it makes a high quality article for the familyarder.

The rhubarb is cut into pieces 1 to 1 1/4 inches long. It is then put into a strainer and blanded in boiling water for two minutes before filling jars. After the jars are filled a 40 per cent syrup is added, which is made by using four parts of sugar to six parts of water. Put the covers loosely and set into water and boil for 15 minutes. Then remove, seal and cool.

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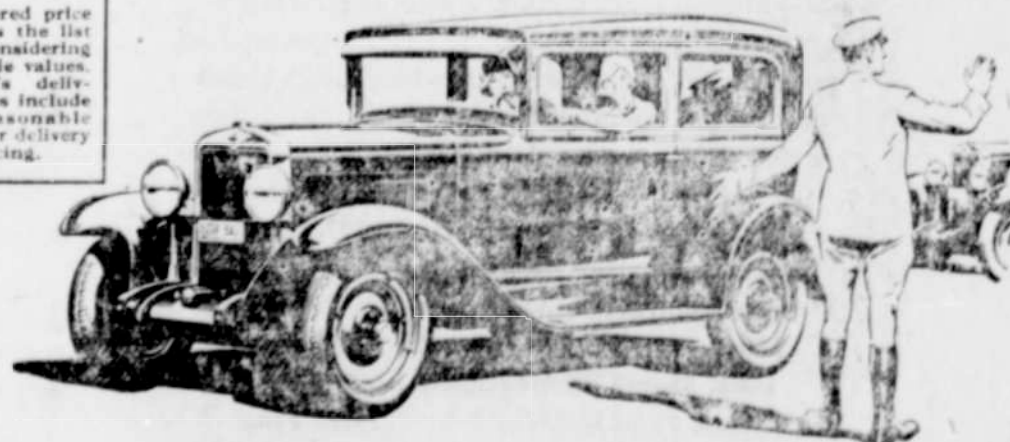
