CITY COUNCIL DISCUSS SEVERAL NEW PROJECTS

At a special meeting of the Beaverton city council all of the members were present. Several very important projects were discussed but no action was taken at this meeting.

Mr. Wright of the Howard Cooper Corporation was present and gave the Council prices on extension ladders for the fire department.

A letter was sent to J. W. Joseph, attorney for Meier & Frank Co. in regards to laying a new sidewalk along their property on Front street.

Another letter was sent to the Southern Pacific Co. in regards to their open sewer along Front street. The Council agreed to lay a sewer pipe from Clements filling station to Lombard street if the property owners would furnish 12 inch pipe and furnish dirt to fill the grade.

The recorder was ordered to buy chemicals for the chemical engine. The water committee were asked to investigate an application for water along the north side of the highway and lay 1000 feet of water pipe. This district has never been supplied with city water. It has been divided into sub divisions and several houses may be built there this summer if they can procure city water.

NO ACTION TAKEN AT THURSDAY MEETING

A committee from Beaverton, Aloha, Reedville and Fairvale met with officials of the Pacific and Southern Pacific stage companies to discuss the new 10 ride individual bus ticket, and to see if they could not get extensions of time on the family ticket to 40 days instead of 30.

SCHOOL TAXES

It is interesting to note in the recent issue of the Oregon Voter a comparative table of taxes for the elementary and high schools. Washington counties taxes for 1928 were \$515,016 and for 1929, \$489,317 which showed a decrease of \$25,699 or 4.99 per cent. In Beaverton district the actual tax levy rate was 24.83 mills with an equalized rate of 18.91. Last year Beaverton had 611 children of school age with a tax of \$46.70 per child. Hillsboro had 1,286 school children and their tax was \$43.72.

NO SHORTAGE OF WATER THIS SUMMER

OUR SCHOOL BOND ISSUE

June 10th 1929 we are to vote on a \$30,000 bond issue for the purpose of improving our high school plant. A petition containing 227 names of taxpayers was presented to the school board asking them to call the election. The number of signers of this petition being so large the school board is impressed with the fact that an election should be called. We believe that this number of petitioners are not only more than the 117 votes cast "no" in our past election but they constitute a majority of the voters of this district.

Since our last election conditions have changed in such a way that a bond issue seems more than ever necessary if Beaverton does not wish to lose the important place that she now holds in Washington county school affairs. We are told that Hillsboro knowing our condition here contemplates sending a bus service into Aloha-Huber community to take from us students that have been coming here for the last 2 or 3 years. The reason they would do this is the fact that we are not able under present circumstances to afford adequate facilities to accommodate the numbers who wish to register with us. We are lacking not only in class room facilities but we have not library room and our lavatories are inadequate for present needs.

Beaverton high school has never had a gymnasium. We have never been able to conform to the state course of study in physical education because our facilities were lacking. These are plain simple facts presented to you with the hope that something may be done to prevent our losing our rightful place in the educational system of Washington county. We are sure that once we lose students that have been coming to Beaverton it will be very hard to get them back. Hillsboro has a most excellent Union high school building and we are proud for them. We should strive to maintain a good standard school here at Beaverton. Looking into the future it would seem that a Union high school with Aloha-Huber, Reedville and other districts joining in with Beaverton would be a very logical thing. This would be one way in which Beaverton might lower the school taxes complained of here. If we pursue a short sighted policy now and allow Aloha-Huber and other districts to be taken from us just because we cannot maintain our place. Later when we do try to unionize we shall have no districts left to join with us. We plan now to start a movement towards sounding out surrounding communities as to their wishes concerning the foundation of a Union high school system at Beaverton. We are not expecting to receive help in this movement outside of our own community. In all conversations held with our County School Superintendent there seems to exist an entire lack of interest in the school affairs of this end of the county. We realize that Hillsboro has a better school plant than Beaverton, but even so we maintain that if Union high schools are to be formed in Washington county, certain territory rightfully belongs to Beaverton, and our county school superintendent should do his utmost to maintain a fair division of that territory. When we take into consideration some of the above things I am sure that Beaverton community should vote this bond issue.

In case our bond issue carries it is the purpose of the School Board to remodel the old building, making more class rooms, and to build a combination gymnasium and auditorium to the rest of the present building. It is a very conservative plan, there will be no "gold bricks" about it anywhere. Many communities smaller than ours, all over our county have high school buildings as good, or in many cases better than ours will be after it is completed. There is nothing about this whole plan to get excited over or scared about. Beaverton community is being asked to make a permanent dignified improvement that will stand here and be useful for the next 20, 30, or 40 years.

It is a simple and safe business investment and any good business man if left to his own judgement would make the improvement and be happy about it.

"MISS BEAVERTON" TO BE CHOSEN IN CONTEST

The Chamber of Commerce Committee of the Beaverton Float to be entered in Portland's Rose Festival met last week with the Beaverton ladies interested in the float and decided to hold a contest for "Miss Beaverton" to be central figure on the float, the proceeds of which contest to finance the float so that no soliciting will be necessary. Mr. Raynard appointed Dewey Drorbaugh chairman of the contest committee, assisted by Mrs. Berthold and Mrs. Talbert.

Another committee was appointed to arrange for a card party to be held near the end of the contest, May 31st when rallies will be staged by various groups in behalf of their chosen candidates. The proceeds of this party will also go into the float fund. The other committees necessary have not yet been appointed.

The contest committee has placed ballot-boxes made by Messrs. Cox, Metzler and members of the high school manual training class in Dean's Drug store, Beaverton Pharmacy, Thuyng's Confectionery, Studio Barber Shop, Mapes Restaurant, Ktunberger's Confectionery and Beach's store. Ballots may be purchased at these places and also at Pinders Grocery, Beaverton Market, 20th Century, Thrift Store, Dewey the Plumber's, White Hall Restaurant and Stipes Garage at 10c for 100 votes and dropped in the nearest ballot box. The following rules are posted on the boxes.

1. Name your choice for "Miss Beaverton" by writing her name on your ballot.
2. No new candidate will be accepted in the contest after 10 p. m. Wednesday, May 29th.
3. If a candidate resigns at any time her votes will be destroyed by contest committee.
4. Closing date of contest will be announced in local newspapers.
5. Votes will be counted by committee every third day and results posted in window of Dewey, the Plumber.

MUCH DISCUSSION DUE TO INCREASE IN FARES

The Southern Pacific in raising bus fares on the Bertha-Beaverton highway and making the 10 ride ticket an individual ticket are going to meet with considerable opposition from the commuters along the highway.

A transportation committee has been formed with representatives from Fairvale, Beaverton, Huber and Aloha who will meet some time this week with Southern Pacific officials for a discussion of the present rates. The committee, at a meeting last Saturday night at the Fairvale community club house with A. E. Melin acting temporary chairman and L. R. Miner acting temporary secretary, determined the kind of ticket wanted and the time limit.

Low cost transportation is essential with a chance to use up the tickets. The 50 ride book, which is most generally bought by those going daily to Portland, is good for only 30 days and tickets left over can not be used.

Growing out of the transportation committee an organization will undoubtedly be formed that will in the future be able to cope with problems that might influence the future growth and prosperity of the Tualatin Valley.
