UNDUE SUSPICION

The flight of the Graf Zeppelin from Germany to the United States, was postponed, according to Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the dirigible, because of weather and because of the failure of the French Government to reply to his request for a special permit to fly over France equipped with radio and photographic instruments.

We do not know why France did not promptly reply to the request. But there is undoubtedly an undue suspicion on the part of the French people that the Graf Zeppelin might take undue advantage of its aerial position to look over France's military establishments and ammunition factories.

In times of practical peace it seems strange that any enlighten nation should hesitate to grant a civil request, especially since it is so well known that the dirigible's mission is solely in the interest of peace, science and aerial transportation. But it is to be sincerely hoped that Dr. Eckener's apprehensions of the French Government's suspicions are not founded upon facts. To waive the restrictions concerning the apparatus carried, and let the Zeppelin cruise on its way across French territory would be an act in the interest of international good will of far more lasting benefit than any avoidance of damage the crew might do to French military secrets. Besides, it is almost inconceivable that a particle of advantage would be taken against France by reason of such an act of courtesy. Angels do things in war that devils would not do in peace.

HOME POINTERS

Curtains of white lace and other thin material will wear much longer if washed in soft water in which Castile soap has been dissolved. A little ammonia may be added if the water is hard.

Window glass and looking glasses can be washed quickly and easily in a weak solution of ammonia and water.

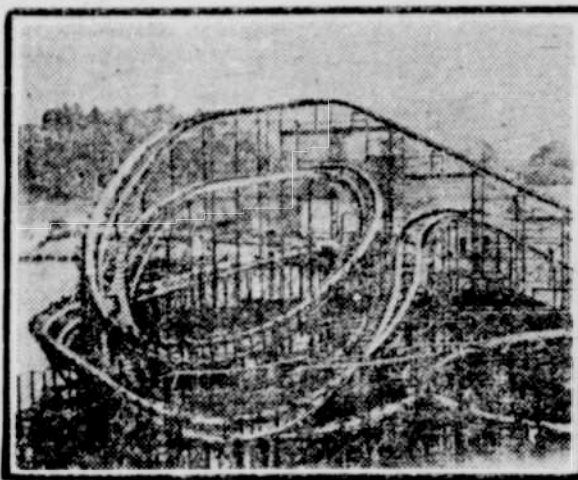
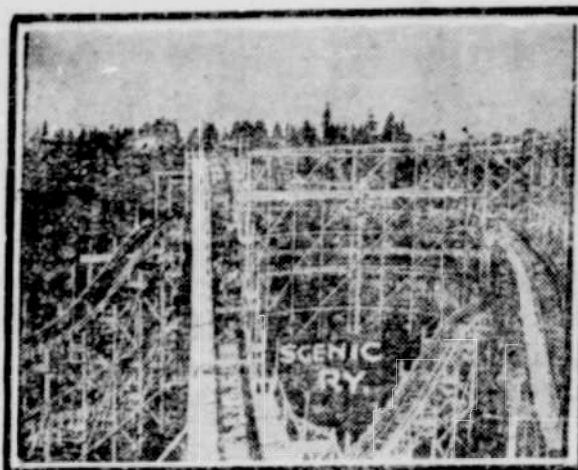
Oil cloth, linoleum and other floor cloths may be kept new and bright by washing with equal quantities of milk and water.

Celery stalks or leaves remove the odor of onions from hands dishes and kitchen utensils.

The use of washing soda makes cleaning pots and kettles less laborious. It is best to fill the utensil with hot water as high as it requires cleansing, add a teaspoonful of soda to the water and set it over the fire to heat.

Mattresses may be kept like new for years if they are turned at regular intervals—one time reversed from side to side and the next from top to bottom. This equalizes the pressure of the human body upon them and prevents them from becoming packed in spots.

For washing woolen goods the use of soap bark instead of ordinary soap is valuable. This gives a firm body, such as new goods have, to the material.
