The Nelson barn, an old landmark, was torn down this week.

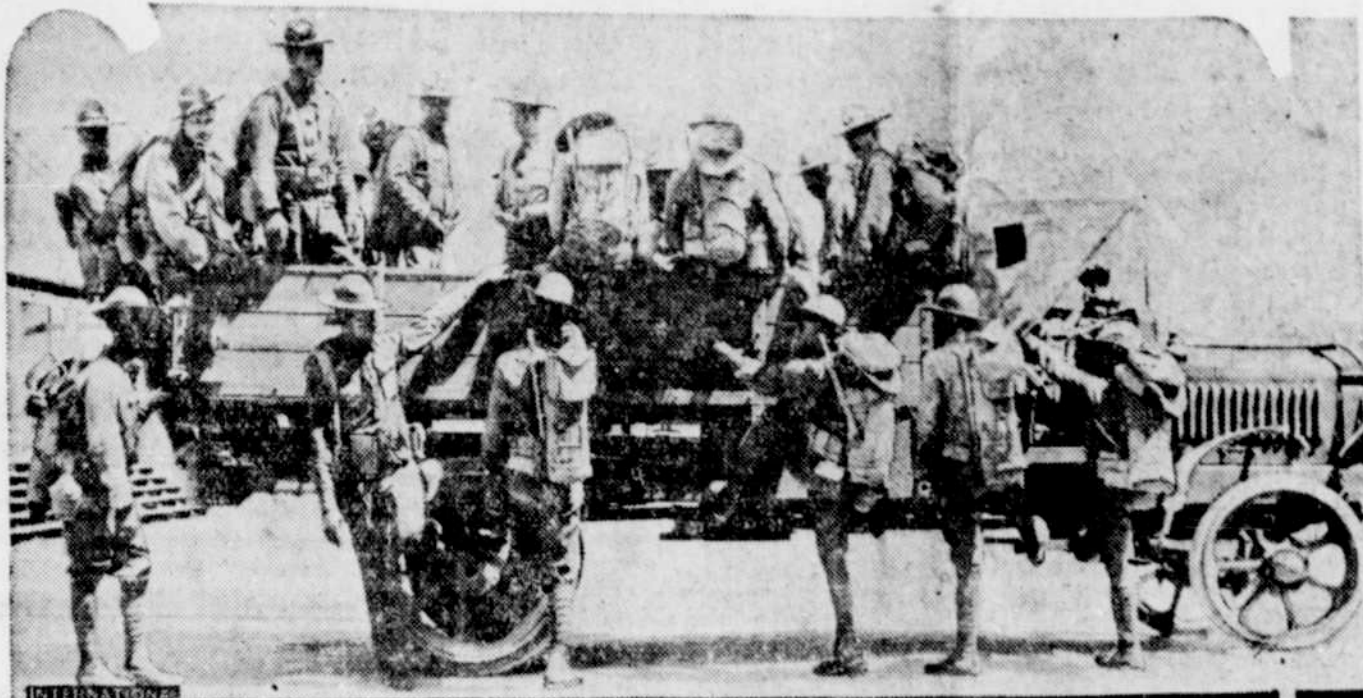
Mr. Fire Hazard is attracting considerable attention in the Beaverton finance window.

CITY COUNCIL ASKED TO MOVE TELEPHONE WIRES

At the regular monthly meeting of the City Council held last Monday Dr. J. R. Talbert, representing the Kiwanis club and Mr. Davenport of Watts Airport, appeared and asked that the council adopt a measure compelling the telephone and electric companies to install underground wires on and around the air port property stating that this action is of vital importance to the development of an airport base in this city. These wires Mr. Davenport continued, make it impossible to use the grounds for landing and taking off as they are a menace to the lives of students and pilots. The council instructed City Attorney Allen to look into the matter and give an opinion at the next meeting to be held next Monday evening, June 10th. Mr. Easter, manager of the Hillsboro division of the P. E. P. Co., Mr. Bauman, of the West Coast Telephone Co. and R. J. Davis manager of the airport company will also be present to represent the interests of their respective firms. A letter was received from the Chamber of Commerce stating that they heartily endorsed an "Occupation tax" to raise money for the general fund of the city. This matter was laid on the table for further investigation.

V. H. Bixby was officially appointed to care for the chemical engine in place of Guy Carr who is now located in Aloha.

The street committee reported the necessity of securing a title to 37 feet along the highway right of way due to a ruling made recently by the Oregon Highway commission on account of the hazard of logs rolling off flat cars, on to the present highway. It will be necessary to lay 1200 feet of water pipe along Broadway street to the Hockens place.

County Agent Notes

Numerous requests on the county agent's office has been made the past ten days for information regarding the "Spittle Bug" which is working on various plants, including strawberries, hay crops and ornamentals. Don C. Mote, entomologist of the Oregon Experiment Station, gives the following remedy:

The use of finely powdered air slacked lime, sulfur, wood ashes or even road dust, if very finely powdered and thoroughly applied, have been known to kill or combat this pest which sucks the juices from the plants and surround itself with a foamy like substance.
