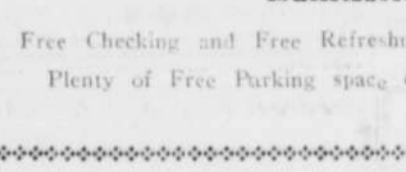
ALOHA MAY HAVE NEW BUS LINE
