CORRESPONDENCE

The following letter from H. C.
Atwell, commissioner of the Oregon
state board of Horticulture is self-
explanatory and clears up a matter
concerning the circulation of a peti-
tion appointing W. E. Upshaw of Ti-
gard as fruit inspector for Washing-
ton county.

W. E. Upshaw, Tigard, Oregon
Dear Mr. Upshaw: I think I owe
you an apology for encouraging you
to circulate a petition for appoint-
ment as fruit inspector of Washing-
ton county. At the time we were
talking of the matter in my office, I
was under the impression that Mr.
LaFollette, the present incumbent,
contemplated handing in his resigna-
tion. Later he has advised me that
he has abandoned that idea; and, as
no objection has been filed against
him, I do not feel justified in asking
for his resignation. That is why I
have not forwarded your petition to
the County Court, and it still reposes
on my desk.

I am sorry that I have unwittingly
contributed to a situation which quite
likely is embarrassing to you among
your friends, who naturally assume
that your petition did not meet with
favor at my hands or at the hands
of the County Court.

You are entirely at liberty to
show this letter to your friends, if
you so desire.
