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PRIVATE INTERESTS TO CONSTRUCT TUNNEL

Corporation Claims Tunnel will Help to Build the Tualatin Valley

Actual work on the Portland-Tualatin tunnel, which it was announced last week, will be constructed by private interests, will be under way by October first of this year, if present plans of the corporation having the matter in hand are carried out.

This is the statement of Ben Reiland, head of the publicity committee of the tunnel corporation.

"Announcement that the tunnel would be constructed by private capital was not an outburst inspired by sudden sentiment, but the result of months of quiet work by those interested," said Mr. Reiland. "We went about our plans step by step and not until we were sure of our ground was any announcement made. In consequence, I feel that our preliminary foundation is substantial enough to warrant my hazarding the declaration that work on the bore should be in hand by October first or not longer thereafter. The main feature of our immediate work is a survey for guiding us toward the most practical and economic route for the tunnel. When we have achieved this, we will have the data necessary for the engineering estimates. It does not appear now that we will experience difficulty in raising the needed funds. We feel assured that these will be ready whenever we call for them.

Speaking of the advantages that will accrue from the tunnel, Mr. Reiland said:

"The tunnel will bring the Tualatin valley as close to Broadway and Washington streets as 35th and Sandy Boulevard are, or, taking another case, 42nd and Hawthorne, by actual measurement. In traffic time the tunnel will bring the Tualatin valley as close to Broadway and Washington as the East end of the Morrison street bridge now is. This is due to nearly two miles of approaches and the tunnel proper in which there will be no cross traffic and also to the fact that there will be no delays between Broadway and Washington and the approaches to the tunnel, to compare with the bridge delays. Beaverton will be as close as Rose City park in actual measurement, and only half as far in traffic time.

"There is no room, except in Tualatin valley, for residential expansion on the West Side. Slavin road, Dosch road, Terwilliger boulevard, Shattuck road, Scholls Ferry road, Canyon road and Patton road are the arteries now leading from the Tualatin valley to Portland. They have failed to attract home builders to the Tualatin valley by reason of long detours, restrictions against commercial vehicles, steep grades or sharp turns. Terwilliger boulevard is the nearest moderate grade route to the Tualatin valley. The tunnel will save more than three miles in actual measured distance as against the boulevard from the intersection of Shattuck road and the Beaverton highway. Statisticians estimate that motorists using the tunnel twice daily would save more than 40 cents a day in gasoline, oil and the wear and tear on their machines."

BEAVERTON BOY WINS TWO ATHLETE'S MEDALS

OUR SCHOOL BOND ISSUE

In the discussion of the present school problem before the people every effort has been made on the part of those in favor of our bond issue to present all the facts. These facts are based upon actual expenditures as taken from books kept by the school clerk or have been obtained from the Oregon Voter; a publication which has no interest whatever in printing anything that might have a bias one way or the other. It has been our purpose to inform the people their right and privilege to know how the money is spent. We maintain that the schools finances have been conducted along lines of economy and common sense. We arrive at this conclusion from a comparison of the cost of maintaining our schools with other schools in the state of Oregon. We believe that in making a fair estimate of the future needs of our community that this change in our school plant is necessary.

Opposition to this plan exists and we have wished that an open and fair discussion of the matter by the opposition could be made. The books of the school clerk are open to the public and the clerk has expected and has been willing to devote time to the explanation of the expenditures of the school district to anyone who might wish to get definite information. The only organized opposition to the bond issue that is known of is the so called "Taxpayers League". Not one of their officers or anyone else has tried to obtain information from the clerk's books. Why have they not done this? Why do they fight this bond issue without getting definite information about our school when it is so easy to obtain it? Those are questions that would naturally come to the mind of any fair minded citizen.

It is generally understood that the opposition to the bond issue are conducting a personal canvass campaign. In the face of the information that those in favor of the issue have given the public this campaign can only be along lines something like this:

(1) We should not spend our dollars for school improvement.

A reply to that is this. That in a growing community like Beaverton, streets will be paved; churches will be built, and schools improved when such improvements are within the bounds of reason they should be made. You cannot do any of this without expending money. We have faith in the future of Beaverton.

(2) A gymnasium is not needed. Our grandmothers did not find a need for a gymnasium.

The opposition, we are sure, are laying particular stress upon the word "gymnasium." They doubtless say little about the eight new class rooms we are making. Nor do they mention the fact that in our gymnasium building are to be three new class rooms for manual training and an arrangement so that a fourth can be made available. Possibly they have not taken the trouble to inform themselves on this matter. Also that we are to find our much needed auditorium in this gymnasium building.

We object to this over-use of the word "grandmother." We who are in favor of this bond issue have grandmothers just the same as they. And we love and revere our grandmothers as much as they, and we believe if our grandmothers were living they would favor improvement for Beaverton community, because we favor it and the blood of our grandmothers flows in our veins. It is not necessary to call to your attention again the facts and figures that have been presented heretofore.

QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTERS AT SCHOOL BOND ELECTION

(From "Oregon School Laws") Any citizen of this state male or female who is 21 years of age, resident in the district 30 days immediately preceding the election and has property in the district, as shown by the last county assessment on which he or she is liable or subject to pay a tax shall be entitled to vote, or if evidence is presented showing that he or she had stock shares or ownership in any corporation, firm or co-partnership which has property in the district as shown by the last county assessment upon which taxes have been levied.
