U. OF O. SUMMER SESSION OPEN JUNE 24th TO AUG. 2

The University of Oregon and the Portland public schools have formally cooperated to establish a platoon demonstration school as a leading feature of the Portland summer session of the University of Oregon, June 24 to August 2, for which final preparations are now being made. Unprecedented numbers of inquiries concerning both the Portland and Eugene summer sessions indicate record attendance at both.

The platoon demonstration school will be held in the Shattuck elementary school building, a few blocks south of the Lincoln high school building, which will be the center of the summer session activities.

"For the first time on the Pacific coast, this will make available during the summer the opportunity to see and study a platoon school in actual operation—an opportunity open to platoon teachers everywhere and to all those who can utilize in their classrooms applications of the platoon technique," said Alfred Powers, director of the summer session.

Practice teaching may be part of the program for students in upper divisions and for experienced teachers and in addition the school will be used to enrich and supplement the curricula of several classes in education, art, music, physical education, platoon, library and nature study, the specialists in these fields on the staff of the summer session finding a parallel closely correlated staff in the demonstration school.

With the regular sessions ended, administration and staff officials of the University of Oregon are devoting their efforts to preparation for the summer schools. A great array of courses, larger than any previous session, will be offered by an excellent staff composed of prominent members of the regular staff and leading educators from other institutions throughout the country.

NEWSPAPER PUBLISHED 46 YEARS AGO FOUND

A newspaper which was published in 1883 just 46 years ago was found by E. R. Johnson in the old James Lindsay house at Beaverton. Mr. Johnson was tearing the layers of wall paper from the walls getting them ready to repaper when underneath the cheese cloth foundation he discovered these papers which were in a fine state of preservation and told of the news of "Washington territory" as this district was then known.
