Good management is always an important factor in reducing the cost of producing pork, says the Oregon experiment station. This means using only well-balanced rations, keeping the pigs healthy, and saving large litters. A very small amount of hay with a little milk or tankage as a supplement to the grain ration is very valuable but the substitution of even the best quality of legume hay for a considerable portion of the grain does not lower the cost of the pork produced, it is found.
