OREGON WILL RECEIVE MARKET NEWS REPORTS

Market reports on all the principal
crops the same day the quotations
are established, will be afforded pro-
ducers and the general public in Ore-
gon for the first time beginning Aug-
ust 1, as the result of negotiations
completed between the Oregon State
college extension service and the
United States bureau of agricultural
economics.

The new comprehensive service,
which include market information
from all principal centers of the
United States, including those on the
Pacific coast, is made possible through
the extension to the northwest of the
federal market news leased wire.

This wire will pass through Albany
in connecting the present terminus
at San Francisco with the new station
in Portland, Seattle, Spokane and
Boise. The extension service has
been granted right to tap this wire
at Albany and extend a loop to the
campus where a full time telegraph
operator will be maintained to take
reports from the wire.

MUNGER BLACK RASPBERRY SUSCEPTIBLE TO MILDEW

The only raspberry in Oregon found
susceptible to powdery mildew is the
Munger black variety, finds the ex-
periment station. The fungus causing
this disease flourishes in the prevail-
ing summer climate of the Willamette
valley, and causes the leaves of this
raspberry to become covered with a
delicate frosty-white powdery mildew.

In the later stages of the disease
the new canes grow very splindling
and become netted with a fine russet
due to the growth of the fungus in
the bark. As a result of the disease
on the tissues, the edges of the leaves
curl upward exposing the gray under-
sides and giving attracted plantings
a general silvery appearance from a
distance.

While little is known of the control
of raspberry mildew, the application
of sulphur dust is the most effective
control measure for mildew diseases
on any kind of plants, says S. M.
Zeller, plant pathologist. A thorough
dusting every two weeks after the
first appearance of the mildew is con-
sidered best for this mildew.

FARM REMINDERS

The ideal lamb for the Oregon mar-
ket weighs from 75 to 80 pounds and
dresses out 35 to 40 pounds says the ex-
periment station. It is thick, blocky
bright in color of flesh, and evenly
covered with white fat from the hock
to the neck. To produce such a car-
casses the lambs need ample food.
Where the ewe receives good milk
producing feed, the lamb can usually
be weaned carrying the proper finish
and weight for market.

Contrary to former belief and prac-
tice, continued cultivation of corn,
potatoes and similar crops on most
Oregon soils is unnecessary. Weeds
are eradicated. Weeds are the
greatest factor in loss of moisture
and plant fertility, finds the experi-
ment station, and after they are con-
trolled little further cultivation is
profitable.

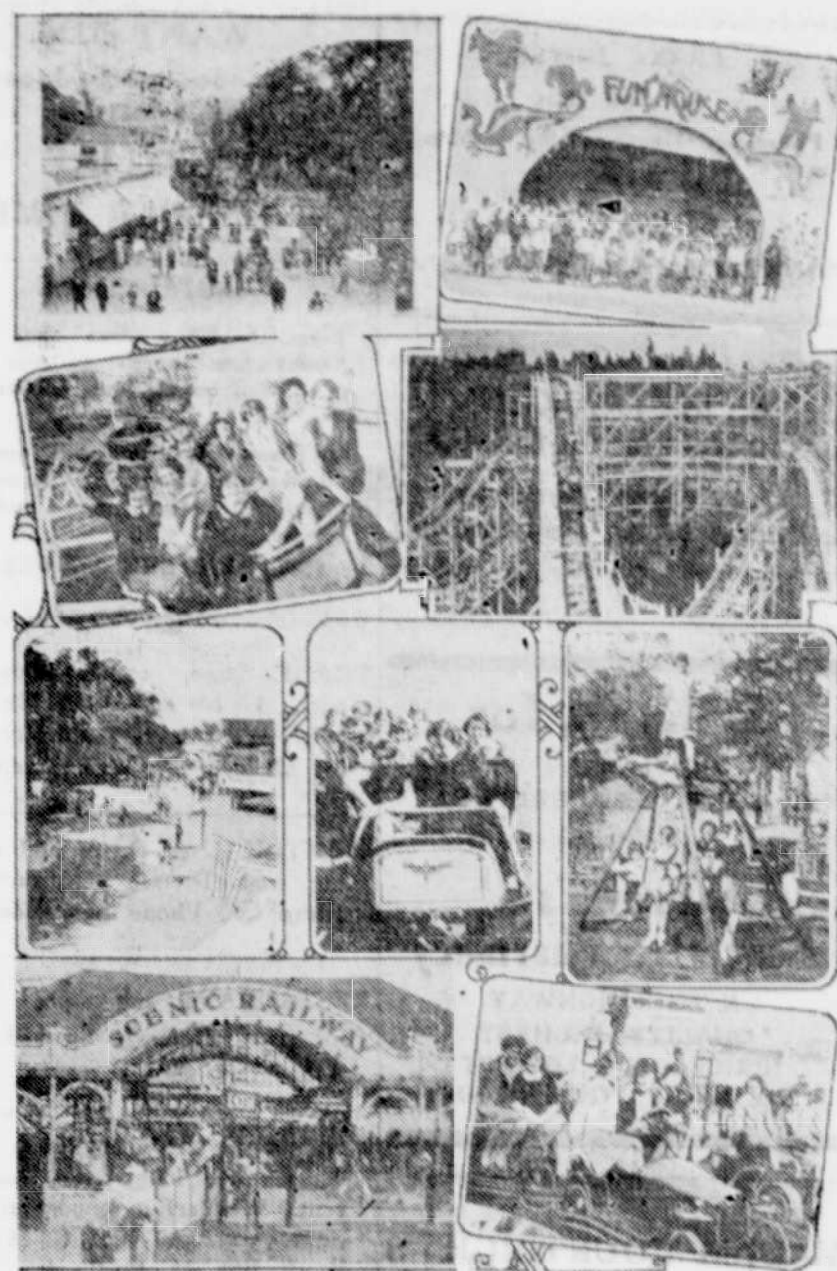
