The Daphne club and their families held a picnic on the lawn of Mrs. Sam B. Lawrence. Cards were the diversion of the afternoon.

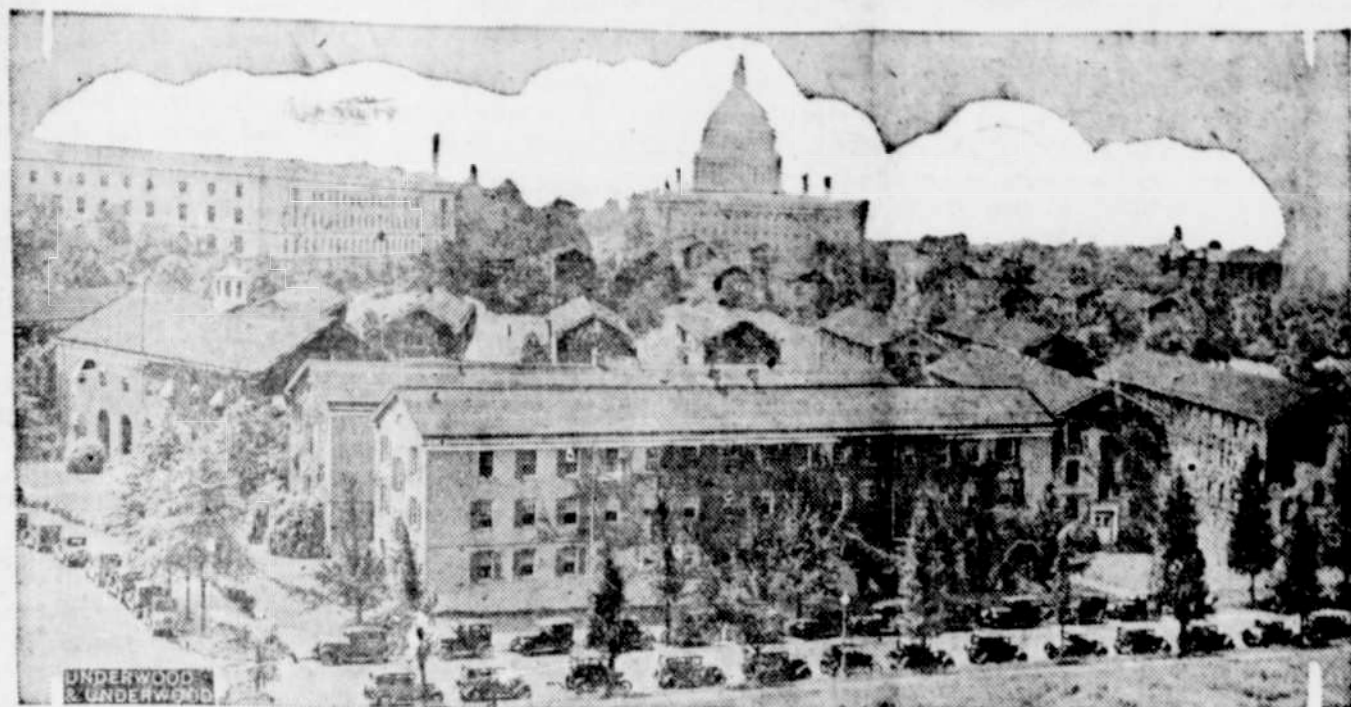

WEST COAST TELEPHONE OPENS DISTRICT OFFICE

District Plant Engineer Norman Towne and assistants Lewis Smith, of Beaverton, and Rau Anderson of Portland in charge. They had all been working out of the construction office in Portland until recently the office was closed and some of the force sent to Everett, Washington, and others to supervise construction work at Gresham and these three men were stationed at Tigard to care for twenty towns including Forest Grove, Gresham, Amity, Newberg, McMinnville and etc., under the direction of Mr. Towne.

THRESHING ADJUSTMENTS PREVENT LOSS OF GRAIN

Losses of grain during the threshing operation, although difficult to detect and often dismissed by the grower as of little consequence, commonly range from one to five per cent, finds D. D. Hill of the farm crops department of the Oregon experiment station. Lack of careful adjustment of the different parts of the threshing machine is blamed for most of the losses.

In harvesting, losses from the binder method are much greater than where the combine is used, finds Professor Hill, after making a comparison of combined harvesters with threshers and binders as to their relative efficiency in harvesting grain. These losses are divided into loss from the binder itself, loss from handling the bundles, and loss through the stationary threshing machine.

One place in the threshing machine which requires careful adjustment to avoid loss is that part of the machine which has to do with removing the grain from the head—the cylinder and concaves which performs its functions by a combination beating and rubbing process. Unless the adjustment here is uniform, some of the grain will go through unthreshed while other grain will be badly crushed or cracked. The required number of concaves depends upon the grain being threshed.

The self-feeders of the stationary threshing machine are also often in need of adjustment. Here much depends also on having the bundles pitched onto the self-feeder first, and in keeping the stream of bundles uniform.

Other factors, such as keeping the machine level, having sufficient power in reserve to take care of overloads without slowing up the machinery, and having the grain dry and mature all tend to decrease losses and increase efficiency in the threshing operation.

PHEASANT INDUSTRY DISCOVERED HERE

Orders Filled - From All Over United States

Pheasant raising is being developed into an industry both interesting and profitable for L. V. Junkin, owner and manager of the Junkin Pheasantries at the Huber acres, West Side Pacific highway just south of Multnomah.

More than 3200 birds were sold last year with orders for several 1000 more that could not be filled. Orders came from all over the United States with one coming by wireless from the Hawaiian Island which called for two shipments of live birds. Many inquiries are also received from Canada.

Mr. Junkin raises the Chinese, Silver, Lady Amherst and Monarch pheasants and has at the present time 18 pens of young birds and is planning an addition of 18 more pens. He has some 400 young birds and will raise close to 1000 this year.

The eggs, which run from a light blue to a brown in color, are hatched by chicken hens and the baby pheasants are not allowed out of the coops for two days after hatching so as to learn to accept the hen as their mother. A pheasant hen will lay an average of 69 eggs in a year and most all the eggs hatch, at least for Mr. Junkin, a nest of Mongolians showed a hatch of 16 out of 20 eggs.

The pens are divided with 6 hens and a cock to each pen and are so constructed that the panels can be removed and the ground plowed and then sowed to oats and rape or vetch.

The larva of the blow-fly is considered the best food for the young pheasants but owing to the disadvantage of raising this food, after experimentation, Mr. Junkin has found a commercial product that is very satisfactory, which he feeds with hard boiled eggs and cottage cheese.

Mr. Junkin has been in the business 21 years and at his present location about two years.

PAUL V. MARIS CANDIDATE FOR FEDERAL FARM BOARD

The state of Oregon has a chance Federal Farm Board, providing the of having a man selected for the cooperative organizations the farm organizations and the farm leaders in the state can get together and agree on a man. At the present time there are three candidates.

On the basis of the manner determined upon by the President for securing outstanding men, Paul V. Maris, Director of Extension, Oregon Agricultural College, is far in the lead. He has the backing and recommendations from sixteen states that we know of outside of the state of Oregon.

It is believed if all candidates for the position in the state will release all organizations who have endorsed any Oregon candidate so far, taking a new vote, counting one vote for each 100 members in the organizations voting, that Paul Maris will have an overwhelming majority. He will thus have the united support of the Cooperative and Farm Organizations in the state, plus National backing from sixteen states, and Oregon's chances for a member on the board would be much greater than it is at present, with the state itself divided. We propose this method as a fair one to all other candidates and their representatives. It will give the Oregon cooperative organizations and farm organizations the last say in the matter. They will have their eyes open as to who the candidates are and what their possibilities are. It is needless to say that with the state divided, as it is at present, there is probably little hope of any Oregon man being selected for the Board.
