NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at the School District bond election hereby called to be held at the high school building of District No. 48, in the City of Beaverton, in and for School District No. 48 of Washington County, Oregon, on Monday, the 29th day of July, 1929, between the hours of two o'clock P. M. and seven o'clock P. M., there will be submitted to the legal voters thereof the question of contracting a bonded indebtedness in the sum of Thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) for the purpose of providing funds with which to repair the present high school building and erect and equip an addition to said building in and for said district.

The vote is to be by ballot upon which shall be the words "Bonds—Yes," and "Bonds—No;" and the voter shall place a cross (X) between the word "Bonds" and the word "Yes", or between the word "Bonds" and the word "No", which indicates his choice.

The polls for the reception of the ballots cast for and against the construction of said indebtedness, will, on said day and date and at the place aforesaid, be opened at the hour of two o'clock P. M. and remain open until the hour of seven o'clock P. M. of the same day, when the same shall be closed.

M., on the 31st day of July, 1929, and immediately thereafter publicly opened by the District School Board of School District No. 48, Washington County, Oregon, at the High School Building in the City of Beaverton, Oregon, for an issue of bonds of said school district in the amount of Thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.) said bonds to be dated August 1, 1929, and to mature serially in numerical order as follows: Bonds numbered 1 to 4 inclusive, due August 1, 1930.

## ANGORA WOOL RABBITS RAISED FOR MARKET

A. G. Griffin, formerly of  
Multnomah has Rabbit  
Ranch

A new source for high quality wool is being developed in this country by the raising of the Angora Wool Rabbit.

A. G. Griffin on the Shattuck road south of the Beaverton Highway is one of the new comers in this field of industry and while the Angora is new to this country it has been raised for wool production for several years in European countries.

While the flesh of the Angora in taste is just as satisfactory for food as that of any other breed and the dressed skins have a commercial value the greatest value of this rabbit lies in the wool production which has many uses.

The wool is much finer than that of the sheep and of higher quality. It is used for surgical packings, baby clothes and the most expensive of silks and wool garments and is the only wool approaching silk in fineness of texture.

A rabbit will produce from 10 ounces to a pound of wool a year and the wool grows from up to five and six inches long. The rabbits are ready to shear at three months of age and are sheared four times a year. If the rabbit is occasionally brushed it will prevent matting and if kept on wire mesh floor dirty or stained wool will be eliminated.

The Angora is considered to be one of the most beautiful rabbits as well as profitable. They are snow white in color with pink eyes and tasseled ears are one of the characteristics looked for in show animals.

Mr. Griffin exhibits six rabbits at the show in Portland last December and won six prizes. His Rabbitry is for wool production and sale of pedigreed breeding stock and inquiries are received from all over the United States and one recently received from South America will undoubtedly result in the shipment of an order to that country.
