Street Will Remain Open

The hearing on the petition to vacate the south 25 feet of Alton street from Wheeler avenue East a distance of 226 feet was had before the County Court at Hillsboro Tuesday forenoon. The court took the matter under advisement, but on Wednesday afternoon rendered their decision to let the street remain "as is".

The petition to close a part of the street was made at the suggestion of W. D. Clark, Division Engineer for the State Highway Commission, for the reason that this street had never been improved for vehicular traffic and that it did not appear necessary for the public convenience to maintain a 50 foot thoroughfare only 68 feet north of and paralleling the paved highway. The street is only one block in length, the East block of this street as originally platted having been closed about two years ago on petition of Henry Neilson et al. The vacation of the South 25 feet would be of particular benefit to the Highway Commission.

Bonds numbered 5 to 10 inclusive, due August 1, 1931. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at the School District bond election hereby called to be held at the high school building of District No. 48, in the City of Beaverton, in and for School District No. 48 of Washington County, Oregon, on Monday, the
