## GRADE CROSSING / ACCIDENTS ARE PREVENTABLE

The one sure remedy for grade crossing and highway automobile accidents is safe driving. Accidents generally result from carelessness or incompetence. Instead of burdening the people with compulsory insurance legislation and tax issues to eliminate all grade crossings, educate the public and enforce practical traffic codes.

Reckless and drunken drivers should not be allowed on highways. They are a constant menace to life and property. Those who dash across grade crossings and give no heed to traffic regulations should, after warning, be deprived of licenses.

The railroads of the country, in their great work to reduce accidents, have succeeded in every phase of the problem but grade crossing collisions. It takes an average of seven seconds for a train to pass any given spot. Yet every year thousands of people, unwilling to wait the seven seconds, lose their wives.

Accident reductions is mainly a matter of teaching drivers when to step on the brake instead of the accelerator.

## CORRESPONDENCE

The mountains, forests and streams allure all of us, at the time of most danger of fire. That means that we all turn to the cool, green wooded mountain forests where we can steal a bit of comfort and fresh air from the hot pavements in the city or crowds at the beaches, and more than all the beauty of God's country given to all of us.

The National forests of Oregon protect nearly 14,000,000 acres of government land with heavily forest growth. It is protected by the employment of forest officers and rangers with public cooperative units. The surest and best preventatives of forests fire is vigilance and common sense, but laws are needed so these can be enforced. Law enforcement becomes an expensive thing and to make our money go further lets stop all man-caused fires.
