

BIGGER CO-OPS KEYNOTE OF FARM RELIEF PLANS

Believing that size and strength are the factors that make either buying or selling organizations effective on the market, the new Federal Farm Board has taken its stand in favor of larger, stronger and better coordinated marketing associations and affiliations among solidations and affiliations among existing groups as opposed to organization of new ones, reports Paul V. Maris, who has just returned from the fifth annual meeting of the American Institute of Cooperation at Baton Rouge, La. As an instrument to aid the board in putting across its program, the National Cooperative council was brought into being at this meeting. This body, comparable to

the American Federation of Labor, the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, and similar bodies, will cooperate with the farm board and the division of cooperative marketing in the department of agriculture. It will deal with congress and other federal bodies in the interest of cooperatives, and will seek to educate the American public to be cooperative-minded.
