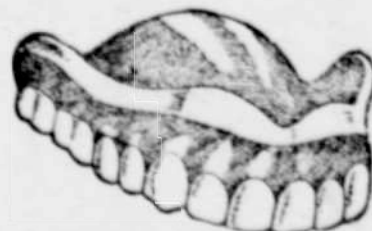

TUALATIN TO HAVE GAS

The Portland Gas & Coke Com-
pany have been granted a franchise
to pipe gas through Tualatin thus
supplying this city with the long
wished for convenience. The route
as laid out is over the Boone's Ferry
road via Wilsonville and Tualatin. A
10 inch pipe will be used from Port-
land, 8 inch to Woodburn and 6 to
Salem. The 48 miles to Salem will
be piped in about 90 days, with an
estimated cost of \$50,000. The state-
ment has been made that the service
line will be run free of charge.
