

PRIZES OFFERED AT STATE FAIR FOR CLUB EXHIBITS

Salem, Ore., August 23—Nearly \$5000 in scholarships and premiums from the state fair board, Governor I. L. Patterson's special prizes, and numerous other special prizes will be awarded to the boys and girls in 4-H work, when they exhibit at the Oregon State Fair, September 23 to 28, according to Mrs. Ella S. Wilson, secretary of the state fair board.

A group of the young people who have been outstanding in this work, including two boys and two girls from every county in the state, will be here during fair week as guests of the fair board. They will live in the large concrete dormitory, will be responsibly supervised, and will have not only the opportunity of seeing the whole fair, but will learn to know each other and find out what other districts are doing. Everything will be furnished them except bedding, which each must provide for himself.

Governor Patterson's awards will be divided among the state champion pig club member, who will receive a \$50 registered gilt; the state champion sheep club member, who will receive a \$50 yearling ewe; the girl highest in sewing, who will be awarded a sewing case and low rocker; and the girl highest in cooking, who will receive a pressure cooker.

Besides numerous premiums and scholarships to the annual summer school at the Oregon State Agri-

cultural College, there will be many special prizes including a purebred Oxford lamb, a Jersey calf, a Holstein calf, a Guernsey calf, and a combination seeder and wheel hoe.

In previous years each county's exhibit has been shown altogether. While this has many advantages the state club leaders believe that the work will be shown to greater advantage if the same kind of work from each county be exhibited together, in order that judges and audience can gain a better idea of comparative values. This system will be tried out this year for the first time, according to J. W. Crites, superintendent of club work, who is in charge of the arrangements for displaying.

Others in charge of the state club work are: H. C. Seymour, state club leader, Corvallis; Helen Cowgill and L. J. Allen, assistant club leaders, also of Corvallis, and R. C. Kuchner, The Dalles, assistant.
