

COMMUNITY CLUB DISCUSSES FIRE PROTECTION

At the regular business meeting of the Aloha Community Club in Wheeler hall on Tuesday evening, a number of interesting matters pertaining to the general welfare of the community were under discussion, and under the head of new business the question of the organization here at Aloha of a "rural fire protection district" proved to be a live subject and one that the club believes should merit immediate consideration by our people. A committee of three with L. G. Halden, ex-fire chief of the Portland fire department who is now a resident of Aloha, as chairman, together with A. J. Gerrow and C. J. Stickney, was named to start preliminary work on the organization and to call a mass meeting for further consideration.

This new law was passed at the last legislature, and in part is as follows:—

"A majority of the property owners of any district, territory, neighborhood or community in the State of Oregon, outside of incorporated cities and towns, are hereby authorized and empowered to form, organize, establish, equip and maintain rural fire protection districts for the protection of their lives and properties against damage or destruction by fire, and to dissolve such rural fire protection districts.

Whenever a majority of the property owners of any such district, territory, neighborhood, or community elects to form, organize, establish, equip and maintain a rural fire protection district, by mass meeting or otherwise, they shall signify such intention or election by presenting to the County Court of the county in which the district is situated a petition setting forth the desires and purposes of such petitioners. Such petition shall contain the full names and postoffice addresses of such petitioners, the exact area in acres and complete description of boundaries of the real properties to be embraced in the proposed rural fire protection district, the

total assessed valuation of properties embraced therein and the proportion which the assessed valuation of the properties of the signatories bears to the total assessed valuation of the proposed district; provided, however, that no land, fire protection, for which is provided by law, shall be embraced in any district formed under this act."

The law also provides for the forming of a board of directors, the election of officers and the appointment of the fire chief and assistants. The district has the power to make a small levy against the assessed valuation of the district for the purpose of purchasing equipment and fire house, and maintaining same.

We believe the residents of the community will quickly respond and co-operate in forming a fire protection district. When the district is established, fire insurance rates will be reduced quite materially. It is planned to have Chief Holden address the people on this matter, and also to have the State Fire Marshal here to explain the law.

So far as known at this time, Aloha will be the first community in the state to take advantage of this new act.

Another New Road

A new road which would connect the Beaverton highway, Hoffman road, Maplewood road and Garden Home road with the west side Pacific highway at Multnomah was requested of the county commissioner yesterday, by residents of this district, and referred to Roadmaster Buck for a report in two weeks on the cost of opening, grading and surfacing the proposed road.

The road would afford a new outlet for residents of Garden Home, Shattuck, Maplewood, Fairvale and Shattuck.

Dog Kills Four Sheep

A police dog in the vicinity of Hillsdale recently killed four sheep on the ranch of Max Ganguin, deputy sheriff reported Saturday. Under the law the county will be required to pay the damages.
