Funeral services were held Wednes-

ered among the best in the collection
of the forest service here.

Mr. Ingram is survived by his wid-
ow and daughter Alice; his mother,
Mrs. Alice Ingram and sister Mary
of Monroe, Michigan; two brothers,
Stewart of Hollywood and Ronald of
Milwaukee, Wisconsin.
