NOTHING HAS BEEN DONE ABOUT EQUALIZING TELEPHONE SERVICE RATES

Nothing has been done about a change of telephone service rates between Beaverton and Portland to bring them down to the level of the rates applying between Oswego and Portland and between Oak Grove and Portland.

The last heard was that the telephone company could not change the rates because the one company does not operate all the way between Beaverton and Portland. Another company is supposed to control affairs at Beaverton. This might be true, but the general impression is that the same company has control of the telephone system in Oregon, though it operates through subsidiaries bearing different names.

As far as the public is concerned the same rates should apply between different points of the same distance, regardless of the ownership of the different parts of the telephone system, and that is exactly the way the public looks at it.

As long, however, as the telephone monopoly—which it is in spite of its protests that it is not—has its say, it will charge prices to suit its own convenience. The charges are individually small, it is true, but collectively they are large—too large. The town of Beaverton is justified in asking for a 5 cent toll rate to Portland.
