State College Announces Change in Curricula

Preparations are nearing completion at Oregon State College for the opening of freshman week September 23 and enrollment of upperclassmen the following Saturday. A new school has been created, several new courses planned, and a number in personnel announced.

Opportunities for religious education will also be available this year through a privately-supported chair in religion, with Dr. E. W. Warrington as head. Any student may obtain courses of collegiate grade for full credit toward graduation.

Two-year curricula in both agriculture and home economics will be inaugurated this year for the benefit of students wishing to obtain practical training in these subjects without spending the four years necessary to complete the more technical three-year course.

Education in aeronautics will also be offered for the first time, through combined facilities of the schools of engineering and commerce. This will include a four-year professional curriculum leading to a bachelor of science degree, a two-year pre-flying course designed to meet the entrance requirements for army or navy schools, and a combined technical and commercial curriculum for those planning to enter the commercial field.

Walnut blight is one plant disease which has not yet yielded to science. Some Oregon growers this year cooperated with the experiment station in applying Bordeaux spray, with satisfactory results, as the blight itself was reduced to a minimum. Some reduction in crop is believed to have occurred, however, through damage to early ripening buds, so that the experiment does not yet feel justified in making a general recommendation for further tests are made.

Carrie A. Golden

Wife of Napoleon B. Golden and daughter of Nathan G. Chase and Annie Chase was born in New Hampshire, October 16, 1842, and passed away in Portland, Oregon, Sept. 7, 1929, having arrived at the good old age of 86 years, 10 months and 21 days.

She was a birthright Quaker and received such education as that church usually bestows upon its children. As a young woman, she served her community as a school teacher until her marriage to Napoleon B. Golden at North Attleboro, Mass., in the year 1867.

The Golden family moved to Spencer, Iowa in the year 1872, where they lived until the year 1880 when they moved further west into Nebraska living in this latter state until the year 1888, at which time they journeyed to Portland, Oregon. The Golden have been residents of Oregon for forty-three years, having spent the last sixteen years in Tigard, where they have won a large circle of friends.

Besides her husband, Mrs. Golden leaves five children and nine grandchildren.

The names of the children are: Edwin C. Golden, of Philomath, Oregon; William L. Golden, of Portland; Henry R. Golden of Stevenson, Wash.; Robert T. Golden, of Everett, Wash. and Mrs. Dora A. Wolfe of Portland.

Mrs. Golden was a very enthusiastic worker in the W. C. T. U., and a constant attendant at the services of the church. She will be missed for many days to come by those who have been intimately associated with her.

Funeral services were held at the Tigard Methodist Church under the direction of W. E. Pegg and interment was made in Multnomah cemetery, Portland.

Josephine Cochran Richardson

Was born in the state of Ohio, January 19, 1851 and passed away at Oakland, Cal., Sept. 4, 1929, being 78 years 7 months and 15 days of age.

When 8 years of age, she crossed the plains with her parents, landing on the Carson river in Nevada in the year 1859. She was married in 1867 to James Henry Job and lived for a period of years in Vallejo, Cal. Three children survive from this union: Mrs. Margaret Menjoulet, of Oakland; Harry M. Job, of Oakland; Miss Louise Job, of Oakland.

She came to Oregon in the year 1882 and in the year 1883 she was married to the Rev. Irad Richardson in Medford. She lived as a minister's wife in Medford, Central Point, Marshfield and Roseburg. Mr. Richardson worked on the staff of the Pacific Advocate for a few years and for several years they made their home in Progress. They moved to Tigard about the year 1912. For the last three years during her illness, Mrs. Richardson has made her home in Oakland. Mr. Richardson passed away five years ago. Mrs. Richardson was a lifelong member of the Methodist church. Besides her children, she leaves three sisters, Mrs. Louise Gregory of Medford, Mrs. Clagnon and Miss Bell Cochran of Aberdeen, Wash.

Services were held in the Tigard Methodist Church and interment was made in Crescent Grove Cemetery, under the direction of W. E. Pegg.

Mrs. Fredrick Cane

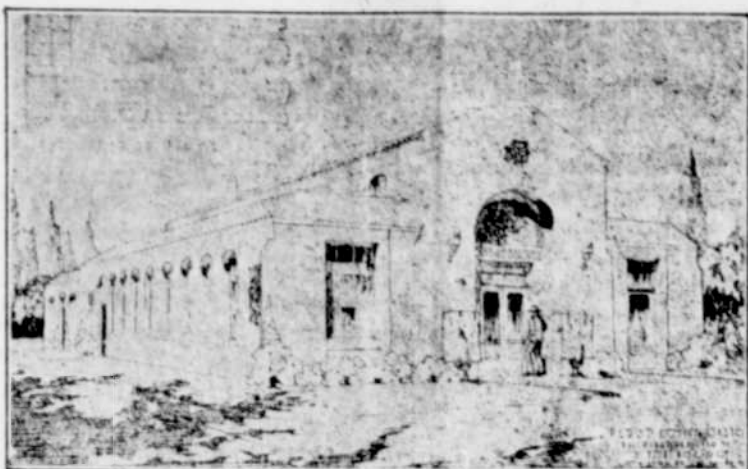

New Bank of Beaverton Building



Above is a picture of the attractive bank building, being constructed by the P. J. Ainge Company of Portland on Watson street for the Bank of Beaverton. This pleasing design calling for a substantial investment will give some idea of the growth of this institution and Beaverton as a whole. The building proper will be of Spanish design—carried out to the exterior in stucco, with earthen tile roof, metal windows and ornamental grilles, etc. The entrance feature which will be of marble, is very handsome.

The interior of the bank is so laid out that it can, when necessary, double its present floor space without the necessity of any structural changes whatsoever. The entire interior will be carried out in strict Spanish design; the floor being of marble, counters of oak, the lighting fixtures and decorations being designed to harmonize. The building is 42 feet, on a plot of ground 50x100 and will be recessed back from the street lines to allow for proper landscaping.

DUTCH VILLAGE AT HILLSDALE TO OPEN SEPT. 15

Gas at 15 cents a gallon, free ice cream cones (or cigars) coffee and oranges—these are some of the features that J. R. (Bob) Johnson has in store for the grand opening of the new Dutch Village at Hillsdale next Sunday. Five gas pumps will be operating, while an ample supply of coffee and ice cream are provided for, so that a large crowd can be accommodated without delays or congestion, according to Mr. Johnson.

The opening of the Dutch Village brings three new business firms to Hillsdale, and marks the completion of eight years of successful business in this community for the Johnson Motor company. The garage and service station are equipped to handle complete automobile repairing, greasing, and service; and will contain two hydraulic jacks, tow car, and most modern machinery for automotive work.

The barbecue and cafe will be managed by J. D. (Snap) Gilmore, who is well known as a musician among Portland theatrical circles. A real old fashioned coal turn-spit will be used to prepare barbecued chicken, raised on the Gillmore farm at Beaverton. The Silex French drip method will be used in preparing coffee, in order to provide a fresh supply at all times. A radio will be installed, and guests will be welcome to use the piano whenever they wish said Mr. Gilmore. Dutch decorations are used throughout, and Dutch costumes for the waitresses will add to the Holland atmosphere. The coffee for the opening will be served here.

Complete drug store and fountain service will be in charge of Lloyd and Jane Ellis, who have conducted their business in Multnomah for the past six years. The drug store at the village will carry a complete line of drugs and sundries, including toiletries, prescription service, kodak supplies, etc. The new store will not interfere with the present establishment in Multnomah which was opened last May. Mr. and Mrs. Ellis are furnishing the ice cream and cigars for the opening of the village.

While the stock will be complete, Mrs. Ellis announced, they will be glad to receive suggestions to add to it; and to secure promptly any desired article which is not in the store.

A map of the proposed project is on display in the office of C. W. Noyes. As outlined the proposed road will come into Tigard alongside the Hoffarber tract past the Lone Oak Service Station to Durham and Tualatin.
