CHEVROLET DEALER CARRIES OUT LION'S CLUB IDEA

To the North American Indian the totem pole was a symbol of the duty each member owed to his tribe. Suffering, extreme danger and even death were expected from all who worshipped at the totem pole. To the Indian, the totem pole meant supreme service to the chief of the tribe. Today, the totem pole is usually an object of curiosity.

In a western city two serious problems confronted the people; property owners were complaining that their yards were being littered with discarded automobile tires, and the Red Cross needed money. Out of these two situations the Chevrolet dealer of this town suggested a very unique plan.

The Chevrolet dealer, who was a member of the Lion's club was extremely interested in civic development, suggested that a totem pole be placed near the depot and that all motorists, with old tires in their garages, be induced to play the unique game of "Ringing the totem pole with old tires." The proceeds from the sale of the tires was to go to the Red Cross.

The idea caught immediately. The Lion's Club erected the totem pole; the Red Cross started to advertise the fact and day after day the Chevrolet dealer, from his place of business opposite the totem pole, watched motorists striving to ring the totem pole with tires while their ears were in motion.

The game got so attractive that the Red Cross felt that other cities and towns facing such problems as theirs, should erect totem poles. The Chevrolet dealer said that one of the most amusing things that he ever saw was to watch two retired men, one a former banker and the other a former judge, cruise up and down the street for hours and throw tires at the totem pole. Every time either the lawyer or the banker rung a tire over the pole, a dollar would be collected. The residents of this little city are much amused even now when these two retired men ask them for old automobile tires.

There are more than 100 tires placed over this pole every month of the year, and the annual income of the Red Cross has been increased \$500 from the sale of these tires.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON OPENS SEPTEMBER 23rd

With the opening of the University of Oregon less than three weeks away extensive preparations are being made for what is expected to be the busiest year the university ever had. While it is not probable that registration will show a very great increase for freshmen, indications are that enrollment of students with advanced standing will set a new record.

The official week begins promptly at 8 o'clock, Monday, September 23, with an assembly for all freshmen, at which Hugh Biggs, acting dean of men, and several students will address the incoming freshmen. Mr. Biggs' subject will be "Student Life." On Tuesday and Wednesday at 8 Mr. Pallett will instruct freshmen on registration procedure. Half of the freshmen will attend each assembly.

Registration material will be released Thursday morning, September 26 at 8 o'clock in Johnson Hall. The student secures this material and takes it to his advisor who will help him out with his program for the year.

McArthur court will remain open until Saturday noon, September 28. If students are not registered by this time, they will have to wait until Monday and pay the regular fine of \$1.00 per day for late registration.

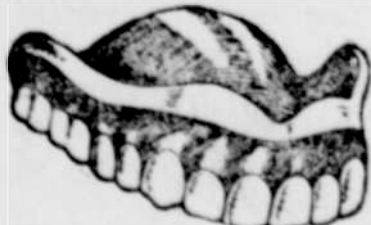

WOMAN DRIVES ACROSS CONTINENT IN DURANT

Driving from Lawrence, Massachusetts, to California, in a Durant "66" Sedan, Miss Marian Collins rolled into San Francisco during the past week, claiming to be the first woman to drive one of the new four-speed Durant creations on a transcontinental trip, according to word received here today by Otto Erickson, local Durant dealer.
